The sighting was made by three (3) civilians in separate locations. The path of the object was from East Northeast to East of Selma, Alabama, in a Northwest to Southeast arc at 60-70 degrees elevation. The object was tear shaped with a comet like tail. Front section generally round and a bright white and blue color. The trailing portion was an iridescent yellow and white. <i>blue (also see p. 2)</i> The object was visible about 4 seconds then disappeared almost instantly leaving no visible trail. No meteorological, astronomical or logical explanation was found for the sighting.

1. Teardrop shape with long tail.
2. Size of object was about that of a baseball held at arms length.
3. The front portion was a glowing blue to blue green color becoming bright yellow and white at the rear.
4. Only one object was apparent.
5. Not a formation.
6. No discernible features other than mentioned above.
7. The object left no trail. The tail was described as like a comet or a streak and holding a ruler at arms length was about 4-6 inches long.
8. A sound was heard; but was not identified. Described as being an odd whistling or screeching sound.

2. The object was sighted at an angle of elevation of 60-70 degrees ENE of Selma, Alabama.
3. It disappeared at approximately the same angle of elevation and east of Selma, Alabama.
4. The object's path was about parallel with the earth's surface with a slight dip then upward motion before disappearing. (moving left to right).
5. The object disappeared very rapidly to the east - described as having dissolved or faded.
6. The object was visible for approximately 4 seconds.

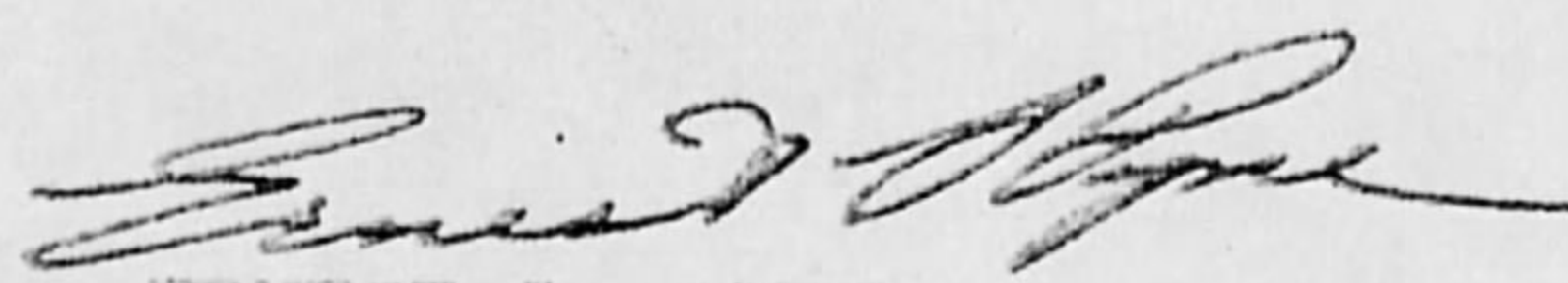

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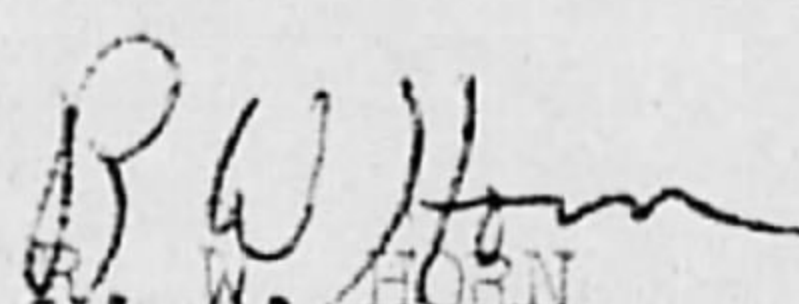

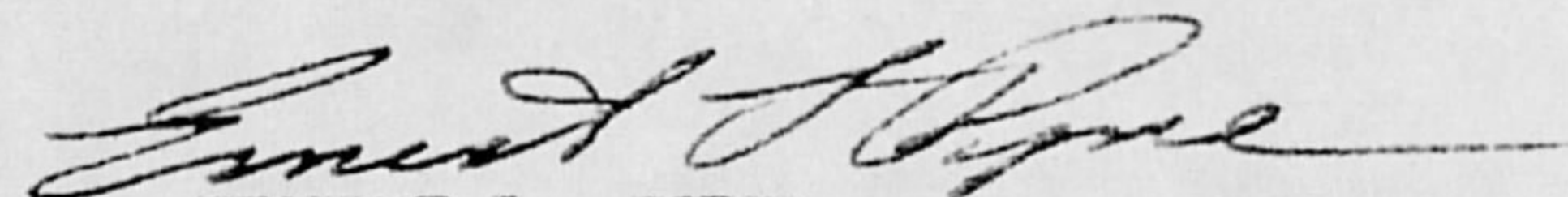
Mrs. [REDACTED] was standing in her yard when she heard a funny whistling noise. She glanced up and saw a strange object. The sound was not very loud and seemed to fade then return before the object disappeared.

The object moved through the air like a streak. It was mostly bright yellow with the front part a distinct blue. The blue portion was larger than the rest and altogether covered a good part of the sky.

It didn't seem too high in the air and was moving from left to right. It appeared to go up then dip and then straighten again. It seemed to be going up and away when it disappeared. The time that it lasted was about $4\frac{1}{2}$ seconds.

She turned to call her husband and by the time she looked around again it was gone - leaving no trace.

The sun was just coming up and the visibility was very good.

I would like to report an unidentified object seen from an upstairs window in my [REDACTED] home, Selma, Alabama at 6:30 a.m., 21 February 1958.

The object was brilliant and incandescent. Its shape was like elongated tear drop. The front part was a blue green and violet glowing like a neon tube. The tail was like a comet, yellow and white. It moved in a 60° to 70° arc from Northwest to Southeast. Length of time visible was approximately 3-1/2 to 4 seconds.

It was impossible for me to determine the height, but my guess is that it was definitely very high.

Mrs. [REDACTED] was leaning against kitchen window looking at a bush outside when she heard a noise like the screech of a bird in distress. The noise was not like anything she had heard before.

Then she noticed what she thought was a cloud forming (moving from one side to the other) until it started to move to the right. She watched it momentarily, then looked out another window for something else and when she looked back it was gone.

The tail was iridescent and the center was light blue, but a darker blue than the sky. The center was quite bright - both white and blue. She did not see the right portion good enough to describe it.

The object left no trail and seemed definitely to be going away.
