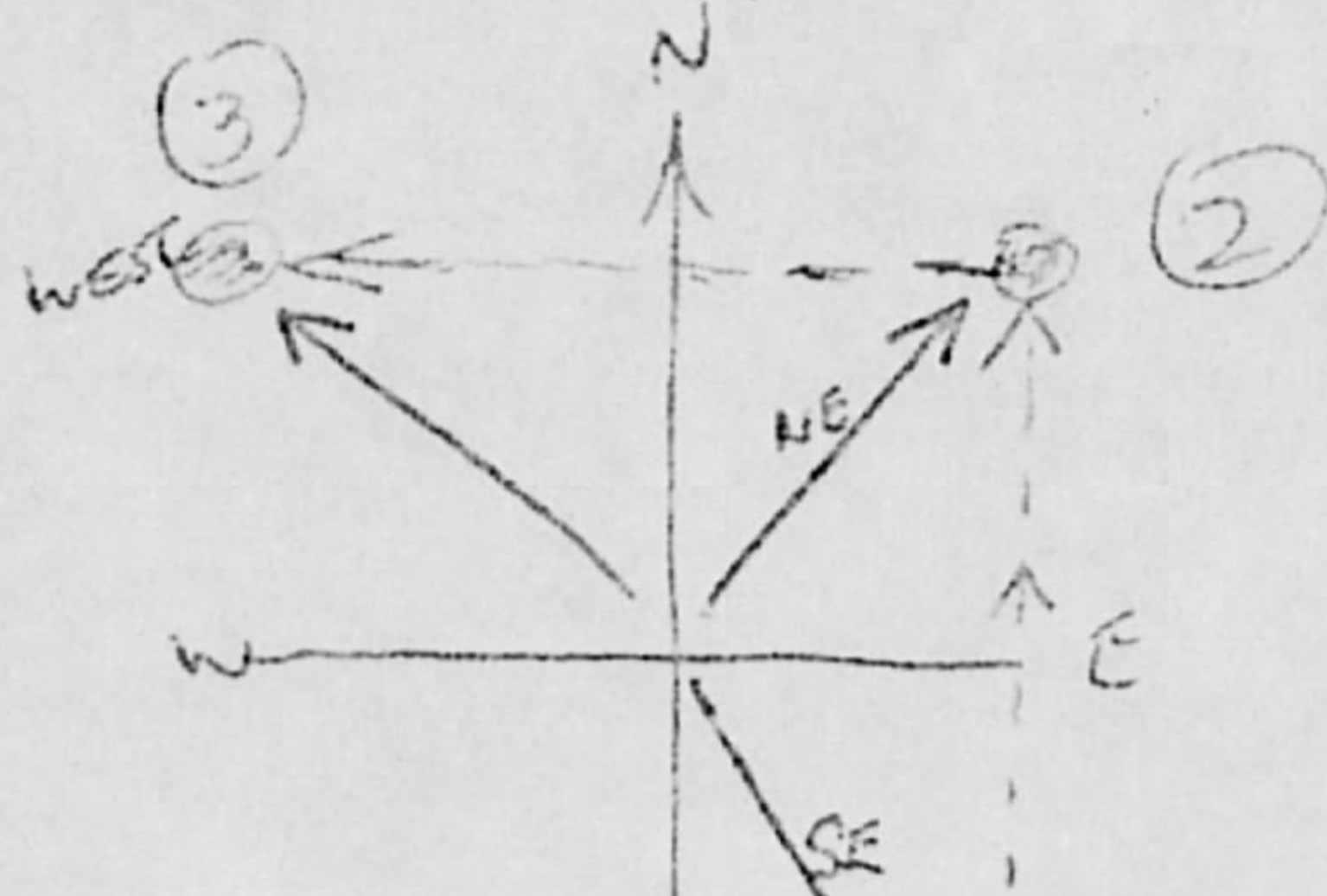

Have requested full-scale investigation of both HQ A155 and local command (GMOA) also a check of area by helicopter via long distance conference, 26 Feb, 1956. Will carry this case as an "UNKNOWN" pending results of the investigation.

- ① Majority of reports showing UFOs having blinking or rotating lights (I, P) are found to be aircraft. However, air traffic check here (11) rules this out apparently.
- ② Hovering, erratic course, and in sight for almost 1 1/2 hours in same locality is definitely a well-known balloon characteristic. However, wind plots shows that the object observed both visually and by radar - was moving into the wind.
- ③ Navy - USAF Wx Charts (for high-altitude tests) Flt. Nos. 35, and 161-70 definitely show 50-70 foot balloons are carried near the New England area here by jet streams. Tracked by both AACS + FCC + Confirmed.
- ④ A huge balloon of this size, can drag the ground for some considerable distance (See JPL Msg, UFOB 1668) without radio.
- ⑤ Also possible for a lost a/c to wander around in the area and blow up the ground after impact.

Brief - Newfoundland Sighting
25 February 1958

1. Upon review of all available data it becomes apparent that this case involves
 - a. Gross exaggerations for publicity purposes.
 - b. Mistaken identification of conventional lights i.e. (1) Red light from some vehicle
(2) Star, seen through adverse atmospheric conditions
2. Cross-reference with respect to specific sources involved:
 - 1a. Mr. [REDACTED] Prime Source
 - 1b. Miss [REDACTED] (1)
 - 1c. Flying Officer [REDACTED] (2)
3. The three (3) separately seen sightings apparently were not related, and possibly influenced the others.
4. However, there were four (4) radar sightings plotted at the time of 1st Sources report which remain unidentified.
5. Pending further information or developments, will place in "UNKNOWN" category. 674

Further questioning of Flying Officer [redacted] on the sighting at 25/0400Z revealed that, in his opinion, this object was definitely a bright star with changing colors due to some atmospheric condition prevailing at that time. The object was sighted as being south-east of Gander, and this fact makes it apparent that this sighting was also not the same as [redacted]'s. But the fact exists, that Eyebrow had four unidentified plots at about that time on an object approximately at 2000 feet.

[redacted] reported two different sightings, the first at 25/0410Z and the second at 26/0405Z, and the position of both sightings was the same, south west of Glenwood in the vicinity of an operating Bowaters Wood Camp. It is not known as yet whether any activity at this camp at those times could have caused a glow in the sky and made [redacted] feel that he had seen some strange object. The clearing presumably found by [redacted] could have been a wood yard made by a bulldozer prior to the snowfall. Bowaters has a bulldozer in that area of this camp, but the officials did not know if it had made such a clearing.

10 The existence of the clearing with freshly broken and uprooted trees as described by [redacted] cannot be disregarded. The fact that [redacted] was unable to guide the ground party back to it could be due to his lack of knowledge of the area. His home is in Deer Lake, and he has been away from Newfoundland for several years. Although quite well known in Glenwood because of relatives there, he still does not possess intimate knowledge of the terrain. Further ground search is not recommended because of the snow and bush conditions existing in the area. For these reasons, it is recommended that a low level search using an L-20 or a C-47 might disclose the position of the clearing. Aerial photos could be taken if the clearing is located, and a study of such photos should give a reasonable explanation for the clearing.

11 Further, the fact the Eyebrow had four unidentified plots at a height of 2000 feet about the time of [redacted] sighting adds weight to his report. Until these plots are definitely identified, it must be assumed that Johnson saw an object that could be an unidentified flying object.

12 A map, scale 1:50000, is included as App "B" and shows the route of the search party and the route presutable taken by [redacted] on his trip in to the clearing.
