Summary

1. Radio MOSKVA mentioned in its broadcast on 19 March 1958 that a "curious" flying object was observed near MOSKVA, at an altitude of 3,000 m. Eyewitnesses stated that the flying object had the form of a big disk, which performed a spiral at a low altitude, then took off and disappeared in the sky.

➤ This "flying object" was a Soviet aircraft with a "round wing". This type of aircraft is characterized by its good stability in the air and by its maneuverability.
