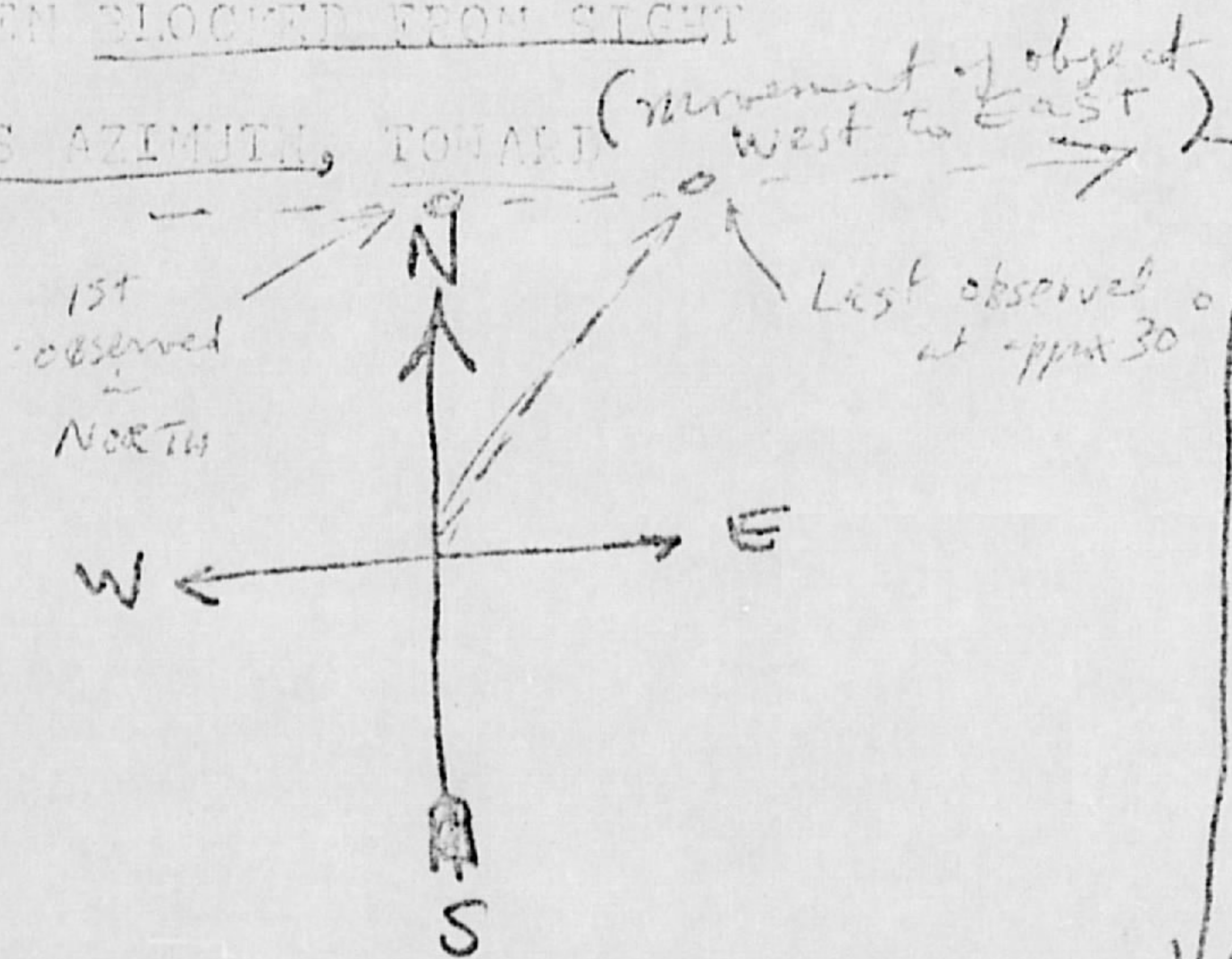

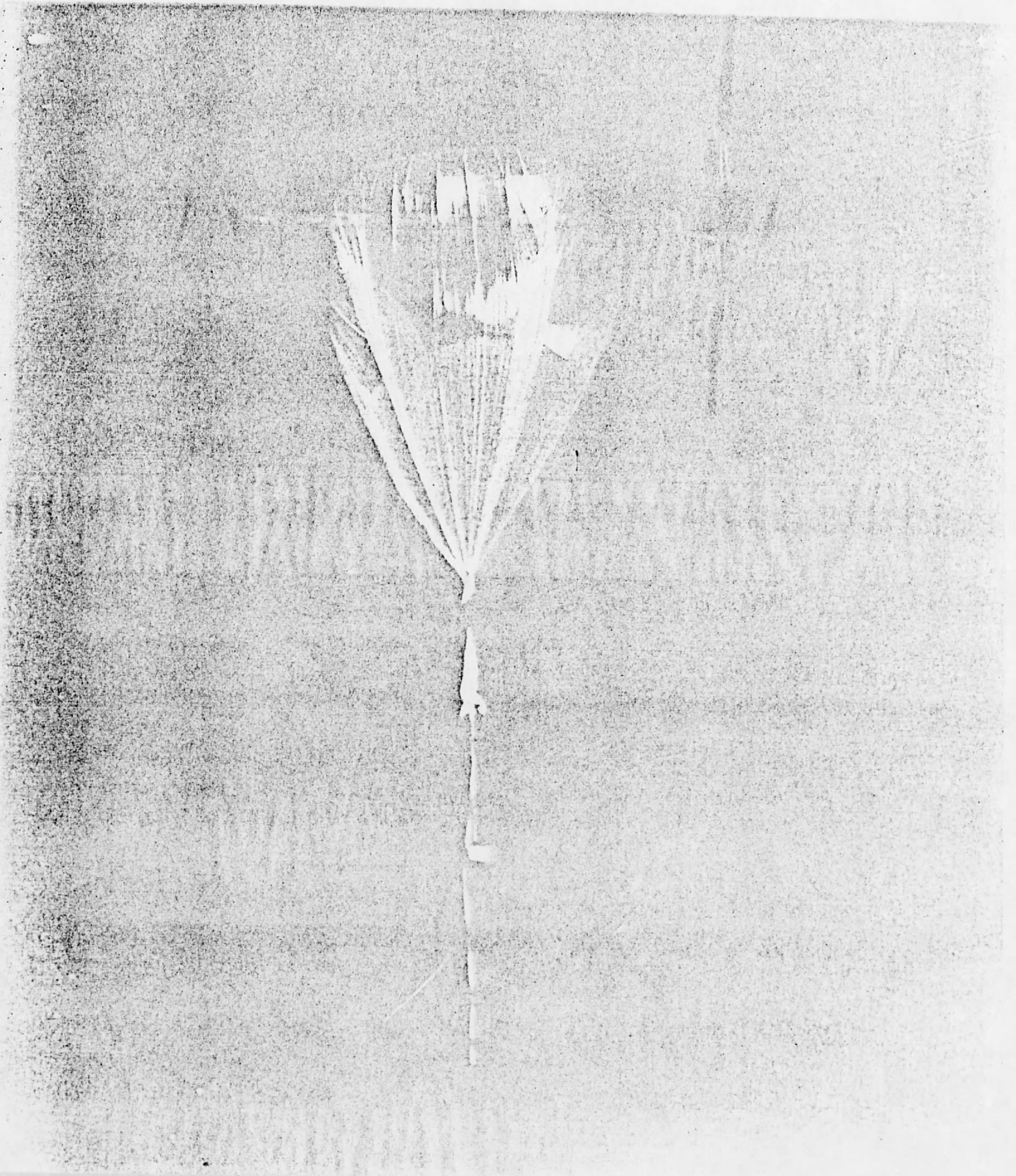

ATLANTA, APRIL 10--(AP)--THREE CREWMEN OF A DELTA AIR LINES DC-7 REPORTED THAT THEY WITNESSED OVER BATON ROUGE, LA., EARLY TODAY THAT THEY BELIEVED TO BE THE DEATH OF RUSSIA'S SPUTNIK II.

THE CREW HEADED BY CAPT. [REDACTED] OF DALLAS SAW A FLAMING OBJECT TRAVELING ON COURSE AT AN EXTREMELY HIGH RATE OF SPEED IN A SOUTH-EASTERN DIRECTION.

"IT BROKE INTO TWO SEPARATE BODIES ABOUT FIVE SECONDS AFTER THE FIRST OBSERVATION," [REDACTED] SAID. "AND IT WAS COMPLETELY CONSUMED IN FLAME ABOUT 10 SECONDS AFTER WE FIRST SAW IT."

ADDITIONAL OBSERVATION WAS THAT IT WAS THE BREAKING UP OR THE

THEY AND THREE PASSENGERS AGREED WITH [REDACTED] DESCRIPTION OF THE BURNING OBJECT IN THE SKY.

"WE WERE ABOVE THE OVERCAST AND BELIEVE THE OBJECT BURNED ITSELF OUT," [REDACTED] SAID. "WE WERE MUCH TOO HIGH TO OBSERVE THE OBJECT TOUCHING GROUND."

HE SAID THE OBJECT WAS A LIGHT BLUE COLOR AT FIRST AND TURNED TO BLUE-GREEN WHEN THE FLAME INCREASED.

SOUTHEASTERN DIRECTION.

BUT SCIENTISTS AT THE SMITHSONIAN ASTROPHYSICAL OBSERVATORY IN CAMBRIDGE, MASS., SAID SPUTNIK II WAS SOMEWHERE OVER THE SOUTH PACIFIC AT THE TIME OF THE REPORTED SIGHTING. THEY STOOD BY AN EARLIER PREDICTION THAT THE SATELLITE WOULD COME TO EARTH SATURDAY AFTERNOON OR EVENING.

WHAT WAS PRESUMABLY THE SAME OBJECT WAS SEEN BY THE PILOT OF A B47 JET BOMBER FLYING NEAR MONROE, LA., AND THE PILOT OF A T33 JET TRAINER FROM KEESLER AFB, MISS. THE LATTER SAID IT BROKE IN TWO AND LOOKED LIKE A "MISSILE."

THE SIGHTINGS WERE REPORTED TO THE AIR TRAFFIC CONTROL TOWER AT NEW ORLEANS, WHICH REFERRED THEM TO THE AIR FORCE FLIGHT SERVICE AT MAXWELL AIR FORCE BASE, MONTGOMERY, ALA., FOR FURTHER CHECKING. [REDACTED] OF WESSON, MISS., REPORTED HEARING AN EXPLOSION AT ABOUT THE SAME TIME.

A HATHAWAY, LA., HOUSEWIFE, MRS. [REDACTED] 54, REPORTED SEEING AN OBJECT GOING WEST TO EAST IN SOUTH-CENTRAL LOUISIANA. SHE SAID THE OBJECT WAS "BRILLIANT TURQUOISE COLORED" AND WAS VISIBLE LESS THAN FIVE SECONDS.

DR. [REDACTED] DIRECTOR OF THE TULANE UNIVERSITY OBSERVATORY, DOUBTED THE OBJECT WAS AN EARTH SATELLITE.
HE SAID IT COULD HAVE BEEN A WEATHER BALLOON OR A METEORITE.
