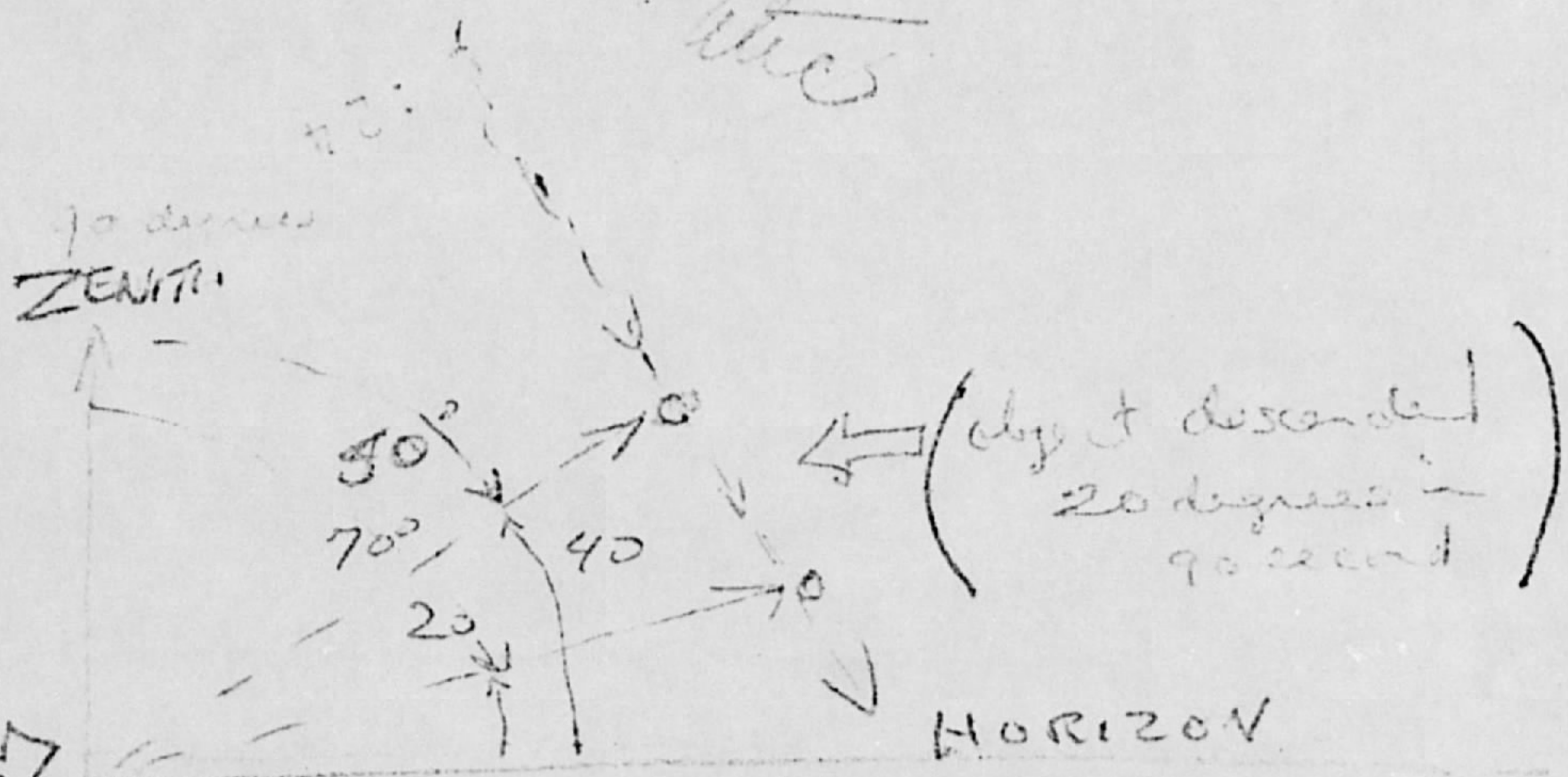

April 21, 1958: Georgia, West Virginia:

A bright bullet-shaped object was reported travelling at high speed over areas from Georgia to West Virginia. Witnesses included airline and jet pilots, weather bureau observers, and many others. A weather bureau spokesman said all of its reports confirmed the bullet shape and the extreme brilliance. The main color was a fiery red with a yellow trail or exhaust. Results of an Air Force investigation have not been released.

ATLANTA, APRIL 20.--(UP)--AN OBJECT FLASHED HIGH IN THE SKY OVER THE SOUTHEASTERN UNITED STATES TONIGHT WITH A BLINDING LIGHT THAT WAS VISIBLE FROM KENTUCKY AND WEST VIRGINIA TO SOUTH GEORGIA. THE WEATHER

INSERT AFTER 1ST PGH OBJECT ATLANTA X X X BLINDING BRILLIANCE. ATLANTA PHYSICIST AND ASTRONOMER DR. [REDACTED] SAID THE OBJECT PROBABLY WAS A METEOR KNOWN AS A "FIREBALL"--A LARGE METEOR BRIGHT ENOUGH TO CAST A REFLECTION AND UNUSUAL BRILLIANCE. (See 4/20/58 + 10/15/57 TS918A4/2) B. W. Invents)

THE OBJECT APPEARED SUDDENLY AT 8:20 P.M. EST. ONE OBSERVER TIMED IT AT 8:24 P.M. SWITCHBOARDS OF NEWSPAPERS, TV AND RADIO STATIONS IN ATLANTA AND THE NORTH GEORGIA AREA WERE FLOODED WITH CALLS.

DOBBINS AIR FORCE BASE INDICATED IT WILL MAKE A MILITARY INVESTIGATION TOMORROW.

[REDACTED], A NAVY FLIER, REPORTED ON LANDING HIS T-28 AT DOBBINS ON A FLIGHT FROM CHARLESTON, W.VA., THAT THE OBJECT "BURST WITH SUCH BRILLIANCE THAT IT BLINDED ME."

"ALL REPORTS INDICATE IT WAS VERY BRIGHT, BULLET SHAPED, FIERY RED WITH A YELLOW TAIL AND PUT OUT A LOT OF FIREWORKS," THE WEATHER BUREAU SAID.

"THE FLIERS SAID IT LIT UP THEIR COCKPITS. NONE OF THEM ACTUALLY SAW IT FALL. THEY ALSO INDICATE IT WAS VERY HIGH. ONE JET PILOT FLYING AT 39,000 FEET SAID IT WAS WELL ABOVE HIM."

[REDACTED] SAID HIS PLANE WAS ABOVE CORNELIA, GA., 91 MILES NORTH OF DOBBINS, WHEN HE SAW THE OBJECT.

[REDACTED], AN ANNOUNCER FOR RADIO STATION WROM AT ROME, GA., SAID THE FLASH APPEARED NORTHEAST OF HIS HOME AT NEARBY COOSA IN NORTH GEORGIA.

"IT LIT UP THE WHOLE DOGGONE SKY NORTHEAST FROM US," [REDACTED] SAID. "IT LOOKED LIKE A WHITE BALL TRAILED BY A RED BALL, AND MADE A WHITE LIGHT." 5- 10 Oct 1957 "B. W. Invents" Case

"BOTH CAME ON GRADUALLY, NOT AS QUICK AS LIGHTNING, AND THEN FADED AND DISAPPEARED TOGETHER," HE SAID. "THE OBJECT APPEARED TO BE MOVING ABOUT SOUTHWARD."

A ROME RADIO HAM WAS REPORTED TO HAVE SEEN ABOUT THE SAME THING AND GOT A COMPASS READING ON ITS DIRECTION OF TRAVEL. HE SAID IT WAS EAST-SOUTHEAST.

[REDACTED], REPORTER FOR THE MARIETTA, (GA.) JOURNAL, SAID THE FLASH APPEARED TO BE A BRIGHT YELLOW BALL THAT EXPLODED INTO TINY STARS.

WEATHER MEN SAID VARIATIONS IN THE ATMOSPHERE AT DIFFERENT POINTS COULD HAVE CREATED OPTICAL ILLUSIONS THAT WOULD ACCOUNT FOR THE VARIETY OF DESCRIPTIONS.

THE ATLANTA CONSTITUTION AND THE MARIETTA JOURNAL GOT MORE THAN A SCORE OF CALLS EACH AND RADIO AND TELEVISION STATIONS IN THE ATLANTA AREA WERE SWAMPED WITH INQUIRIES.

LOUISVILLE, KY., APRIL 21.--(UP)--THE NAVY BEGAN AN INVESTIGATION TODAY INTO THE CRASH OF A TV-2 NAVY JET TRAINER PLANE SAID TO HAVE EXPLODED INTO A BALL OF FIRE AFTER ITS PILOT BAILED OUT.

THE NAVY SAID MARINE CORPS CAPT. [REDACTED] OF COLUMBUS, OHIO, WAS ENROUTE FROM PENSACOLA, FLA., TO THE COLUMBUS, OHIO, NAVAL AIR STATION WHEN THE ACCIDENT OCCURRED. BALL WAS TAKEN TO THE GENERAL HOSPITAL HERE.

MEMBERS OF THE NAVY AIRCRAFT ACCIDENT BOARD WERE SCHEDULED TO ARRIVE HERE TODAY TO INVESTIGATE THE CRASH.

MR. AND MRS. GEORGE UNT, WHO LIVE NEAR WHERE THE PLANE CRASHED, SAID THEY SAW AN ORANGE STREAK, HEARD A LOUD EXPLOSION AND THEN SAW A BALL OF FIRE.

THE PLANE CRASHED NEAR THE INTERSECTION OF TWO MAIN EXPRESSWAYS, ABOUT A MILE AND A HALF FROM SUBURBAN BOWMAN AIR FIELD.

BALL PARACHUTED INTO A NEARBY SUBDIVISION AND WAS TAKEN TO THE HOSPITAL BY JEFFERSON COUNTY POLICE.
