1. Object disappeared in same location as when 1st
sighted, yet object supposedly moved.
2. Time of sighting is given as two different times;
doesn't say whether obj. sighted twice or whether
time of sighting was between times reported.
3. Observer states weather "very clear, no winds";
weather reports indicate a surface wind of 10 knots,
thunderstorms in all areas of sighting with 8
cloud coverage at 12,000'.
