While on a routine flight, Captain Clutter noticed a blue flame at an altitude of approximately 26,000 feet. It seemed to be going in a northwesterly direction and to be gradually descending. The duration of the observation was approximately four seconds. It appeared that the object either flew out of sight or disintegrated, although there was no visual evidence of an explosion. Captain Clutter is regarded as a reliable pilot, consequently we have given him, the source, a high rating. On the other hand, no unusual reports have been coming into us from regular intelligence channels that would offer collaboration to this sighting, and it therefore has been given a low rating.
