HIS ORIGINAL AND SUBSEQUENT OBSERVATIONS WERE CHECKED AND

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FOUND REASONABLE ACCURATE. THE BEHAVIOR AND COURSE OF THE OBJECT
CORRELATES CLOSELY WITH THE PREDICTED ORBITAL TRACK OF THE
FIRST MAGNITUDE STAR CIRRUS. THE TRACK OF THE OBJECT WAS
CORRELATED WITH THE COOPERATION OF THE AIR NAVIGATION SECTION
HQ SAC. BASED ON MY PRIOR OBSERVATIONS OF CIRRUS AS AN AMATEUR
ASTRONOMER I AM CERTAIN THAT THE OBJECT REPORTED WAS THIS STAR.
INITIALLY REPORTED RAPID MOVEMENT CAN BE ACCOUNTED FOR DUE TO
THE TWO TEMPERATURE INVERSIONS. NORMAL CHARACTERISTICS OF
THIS STAR AND ITS USUAL COURSE WERE DISCUSSED WITH THE OBSERVER
WHO AGREED THAT THE OBJECT WAS EVIDENTLY A STAR.
