A Mysterious Object in Sky Thrills a Jet

Capt. J. R. Petrie of Trans World Airlines is an experienced airman, not given to believing in flying saucers or even witches with Halloween just two weeks away.

But yesterday, when Petrie spotted a gleaming object high in the sky above Toledo, O., he blinked, then asked for a camera.

Petrie had been enjoying the clear air and bright sunshine at 28,000 feet as he cruised his giant Boeing 707 jet from New York City to Chicago. The view was excellent there, high above the Ohio farmland. Back in the cabin, 56 passengers were enjoying their lunch.

Photographs Object

The object, about 100 feet in diameter and almost translucent, appeared to be at an altitude of 105,000 to 110,000 feet, far above his jet.

A radar control center in the Toledo area radioed Capt. Petrie and requested that he pursue this object.

Petrie radioed back that he couldn't do that because it would mean deviating from his flight plan. But he offered to do the next best thing. He borrowed the cameras of three passengers and clicked

away from his 28,000 foot vantage point in the sky.

Well, sir, it was pretty exciting up there for a while, what with Capt. Petrie swinging the jet from side to side so that all the passengers could glimpse the gleaming, mysterious sphere.

Was it a flying saucer? They asked the stewardesses. Could it be something from outer space? Was it apt to start shooting?

A determined Capt. Petrie kept hanging away with his borrowed cameras, then continued on toward Chicago, radioing the sighting of the unidentified object to his line's office at O'Hare International airport.

When Petrie rolled the jet to a halt outside the terminal, he was greeted by airline officials and representatives of the air force.

Air Force Gets Film

The passengers went on their way and Capt. Petrie turned the film over to Maj. Harvey W. McDaniel. Some experts said they thought the object might have been a weather observation balloon, released from a Detroit airport.

Maj. McDaniel packed the film into a plane and sent it on its way to 33d air division headquarters at Trux Field, Madison, Wis. Experts there presumably will be able to tell Capt. Petrie what he and his passengers saw high above Ohio.

Aerospace Research Called Key to Future

Lockheed's Gross Tells Bankers Meeting
of Tremendous Strides Made in 15 Years

Under the prime force of aerospace research there has never been a period in world history when a nation has brought forth as many new and different products as have emerged from America's laboratories in the past 15 years, Lockheed Aircraft Corp.'s board chairman Robert E. Gross, declared yesterday.

The vast "non-military fall-out" of industrial and commercial products to improve daily living has resulted from defense spending, he told some 1,600 delegates at the opening-day session of the national convention of the Assn for Bank Audit, Control and Operations at the Statler Hilton.

Two Main Factors

Microminiaturization and increased reliability were singled out by Gross as the most important benefits to industrial and commercial products coming out of current defense spending and space exploration.

He said we're building things so small that "a speck of dust can jam up the whole works and a sneeze can ruin a whole day's output."

Now on the market or under development, he enumerated such products as invisible hearing aids, electric watches with match-head sized batteries, tiny bearings for surgical instruments and radio pills that, when swal-

lowed, can broadcast information about bodily processes.

Gross identified two broad categories of space programs—military and nonmilitary—and declared that definite patterns for the development of both are now emerging.

Real Progress

"There seems to be emerging a rational and logical space planning and accomplishment phase," he said. "It begins to look as though we really know where we're going. We have defined objectives and are making real progress."

He reviewed the progress in our second generation of military and non-military satellites and declared that space exploration is building "a second renaissance of learning and enthusiasm as well as a new, invigorating climate of the mind." "This," he added, "may open the door to ultimate world peace. Already we are seeing signs of the kind of international co-operation it imposes."

AE PREPARES QF-104 PROGRAM FOR TESTS

Air Force crews are winding up training to begin flight testing of the Lockheed F-104 as a pilotless aircraft. The program is slated to get underway in November at Eglin AFB, Fla. Two dozen F-104s are to fly missions at more than mach 2 under remote control by ground or airborne operators. Flight tests of prototype QF-104 are being conducted at Lockheed's Palmdale, Calif., flight test center. Sperry Phoenix Co. has developed the drone stabilization and control system which enables the jet to takeoff under remote control, fly exacting missions and land.
