Objt was observed momentarily before going out of sight behind a barn and observer could not estimate size. Objt was traveling low in a flat trajectory.				11. COMMENTS One witness reported seeing objt. However, there were apparently several witnesses in several parts of Maine, according to newspaper reports. Description of objt is characteristic of a fireball, and it was apparently large and very high.
