10. BRIEF SUMMARY OF SIGHTING Bright, star-like objects. 1 objt was stationary and appeared to have a man circumventing upper part. After a few minutes a much smaller objt seemed to "shoot" out side of bigger objt. It was headed NE. Came out very fast then slowed down. Large objt "shrunk" and seemed to disintegrate.			11. COMMENTS Witness reports that objt was observed for 30 min fm a highly populated area, yet she was apparently only person who saw it. Witness also states that she has "stigmatisms" in both eyes, which could account for impressions of witness. Due to absence of corroborating witnesses, this sighting is evaluated as insufficient data.

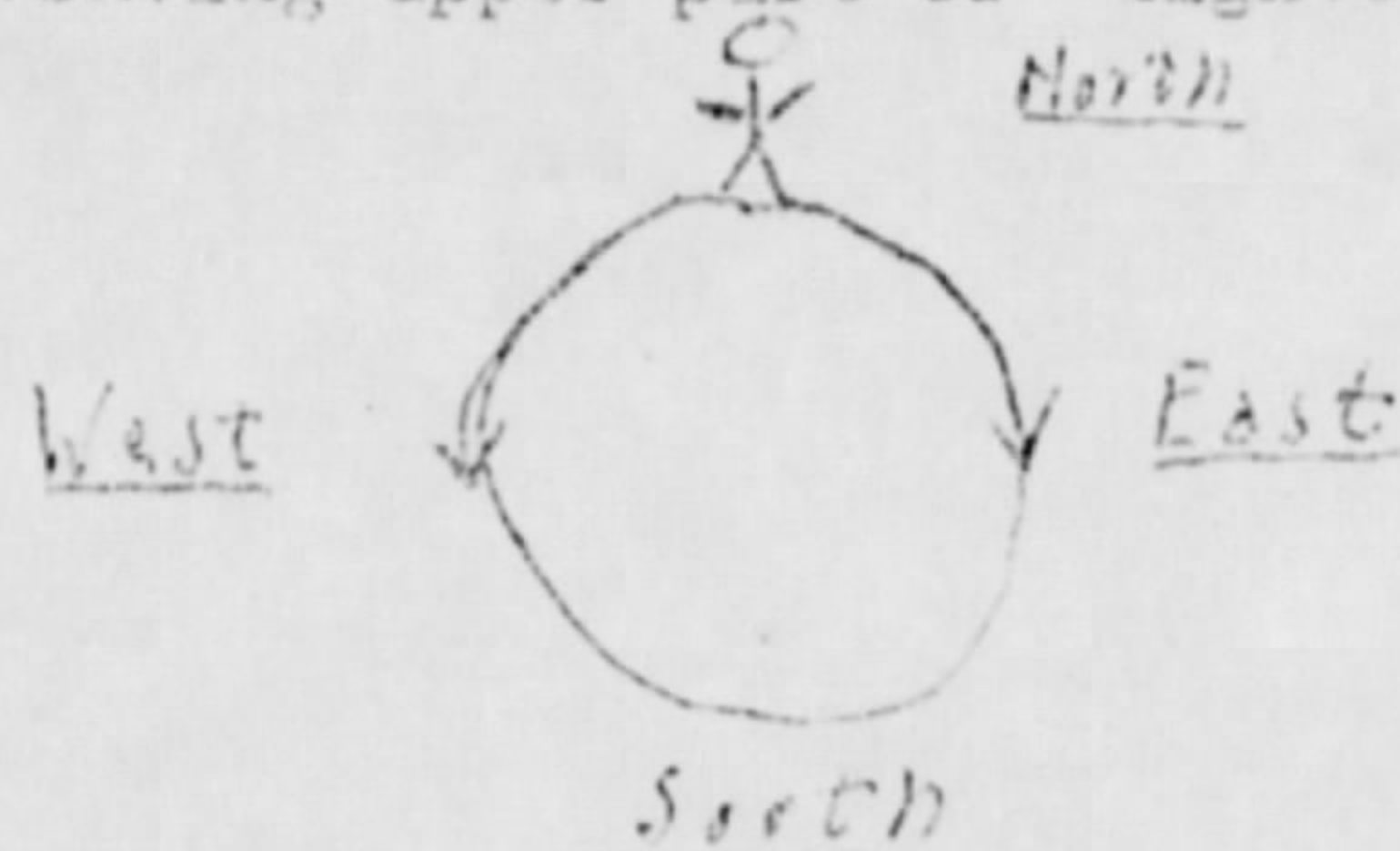

Before reporting observed object wish to point out that writer is far-sighted and possesses stigmatism both eyes.

Tuesday, May 23, 1961, observed from window, third floor, 35-14 28th Avenue, Astoria, Long Island, New York, between 5:15 A/M and 5:25 A/M was a round light east of observation point; stationary, and centered in area of Bulova Watch Company, 75-20 Astoria Boulevard, Jackson Heights, appearing at first to be a star, although not high enough in atmosphere.

The sky ceiling was blue, clear; visibility extensive. It appeared as if a man were circumventing upper part of "lighted globe". ILLUSTRATION BELOW:



Felt it was an optical illusion. To verify assumption turned eyes away from "globe" for few minutes and then returned vision to same. It still revealed impression man was half circumventing sides of "globe". At 5:20 A/M an unidentified object was released from west side of "globe", travelling northeast in the direction of Fort Schuyler. Original release at fast speed (action similar to skeet target release), slowing up to a normal aeroplane glide in decent to earth, or final destination. From observation point released "disc" appeared round in shape; brown in color.

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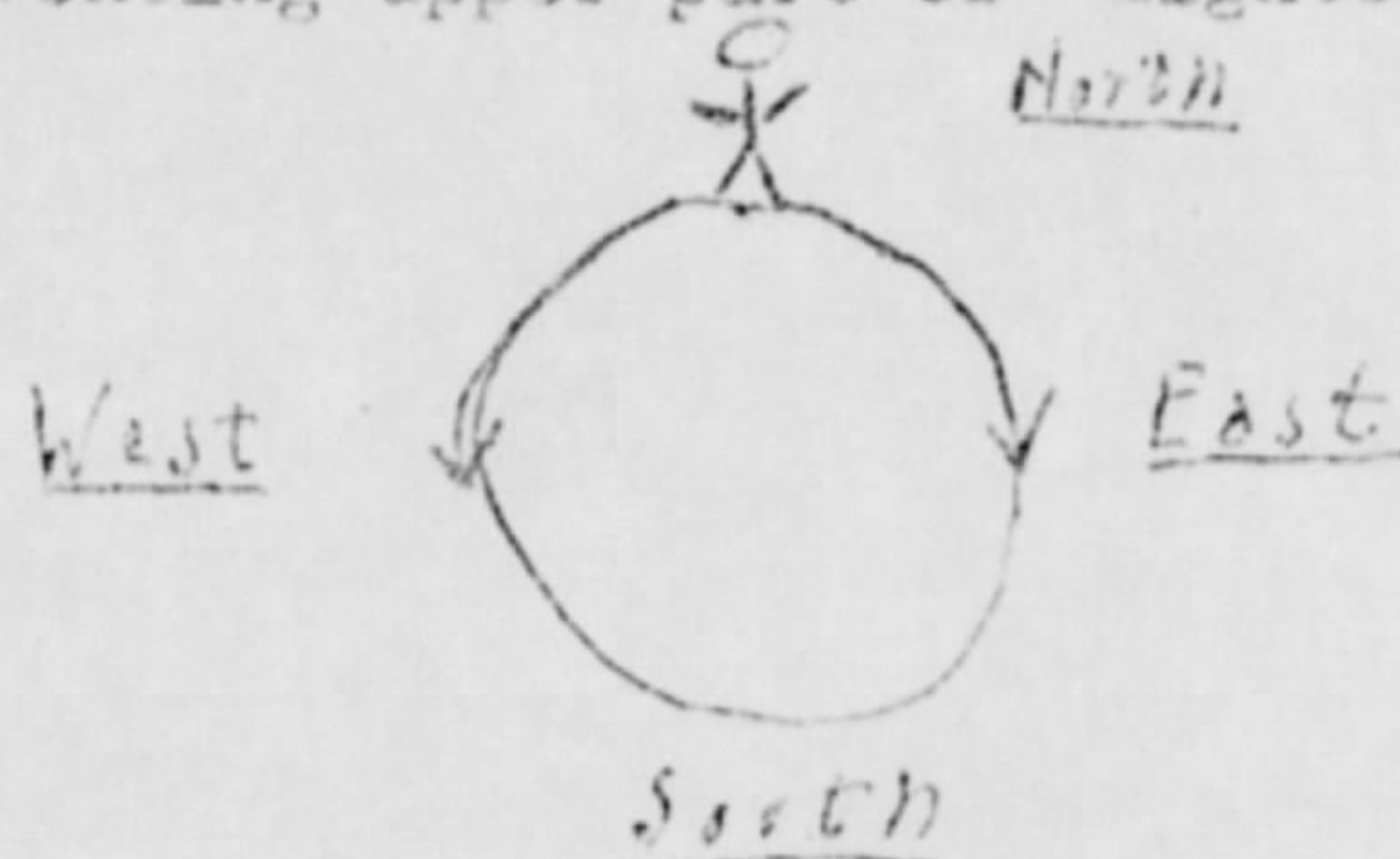

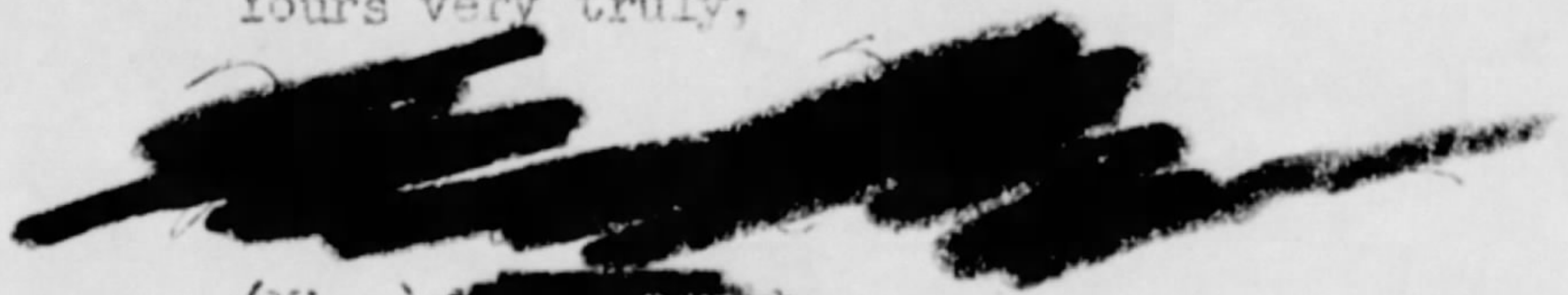
Coinciding with object release, a flock of pigeons (approximately twelve) flew from the direction of New York City northeast toward Fort Schuyler at normal commercial plane height. Simultaneously, west of observation point an aeroplane, unidentified, at commercial transport level, came from the west headed east in direction of/and underneath the lighted "globe". To the naked eye, the plane was cumbersome in structure, red lights blinking back and front, topped by what appeared to be helicopter propellers.

In viewing the lighted "globe" between 5:20 A/M and approximately 5:45 A/M it shrunk in size and started to shift to southeast of observation point.

During disintegration a black, smoky film encompassed the lighted "globe". This film formed opinion, in observer's mind, that what firstly appeared to be a human circumventing "globe", could have been a chemical helium either mechanically timed for release of flying "disc", or reaction of outside coating of lighted "globe" contacting atmospherical elements.

Not being mechanically, or scientifically trained, hope this detailed report will prove of interest and benefit.

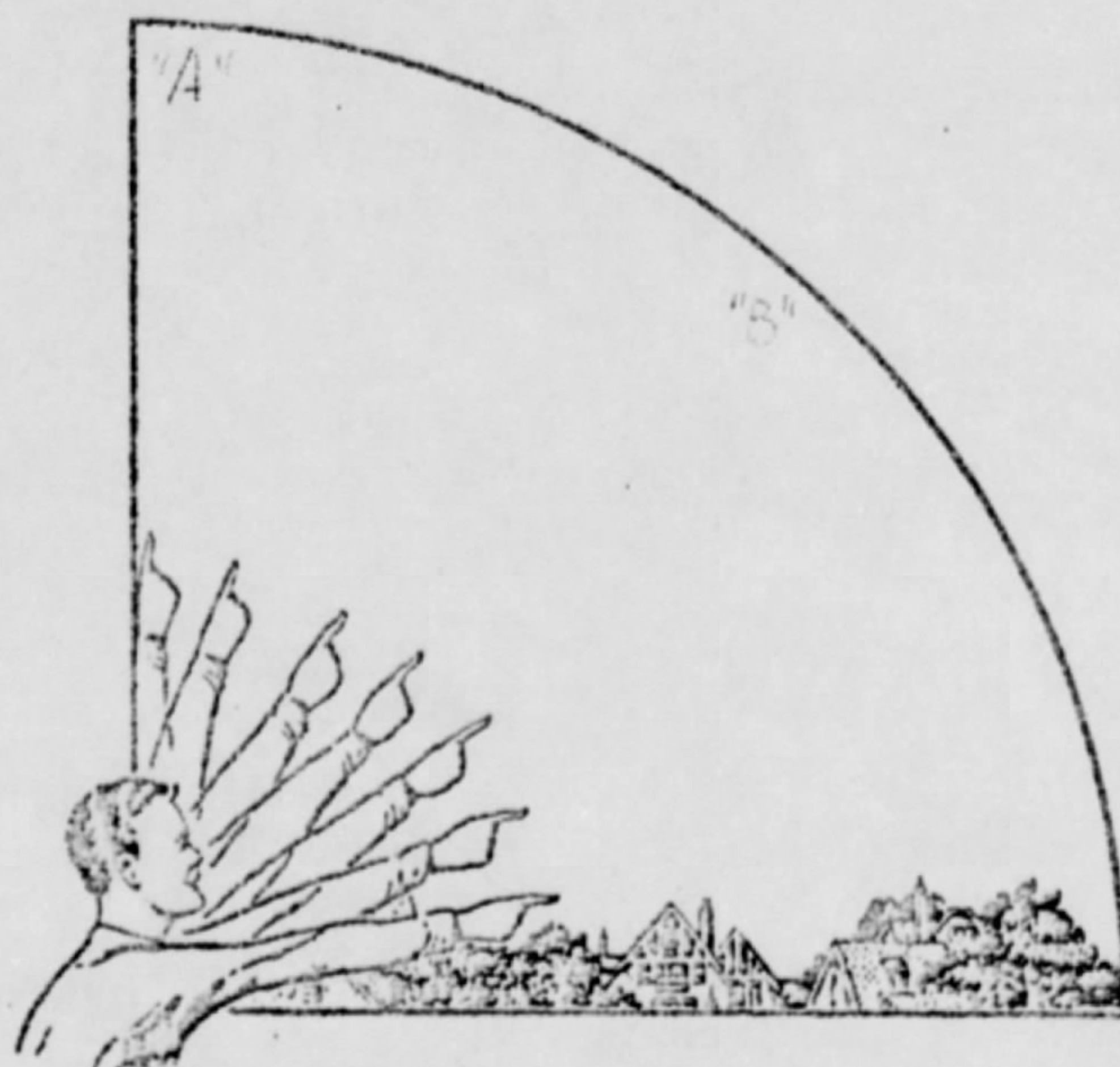

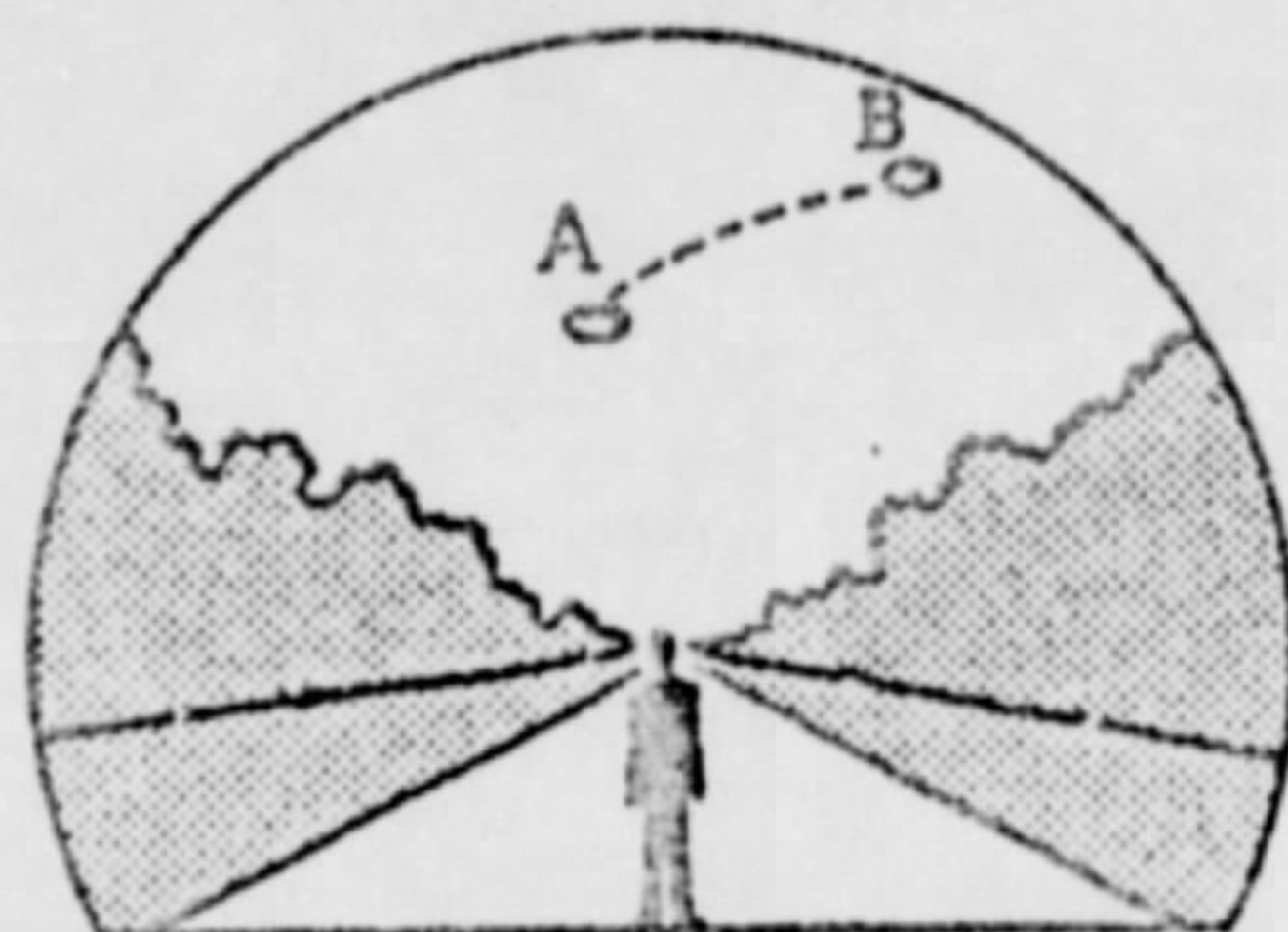
