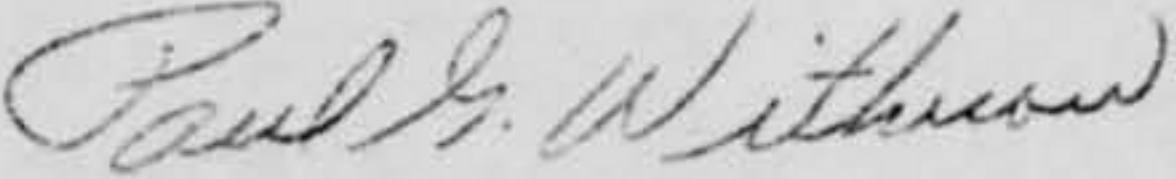

REPORT OF UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT

a. Description:

(1) Shape: Appeared as large light similar to North Star in size and brightness when viewed from the ground.

(2) Size compared to a "pea" when held in the hand at about arms length.

(3) Color: White center with bluish-red halo effect resembling hot flame.

(4) Number: One

(5) Formation: N/A

(6) Discernible features or details: Seemed to hesitate and waver or oscillate to left or right, then continue to move on NNW course. Pattern repeated at irregular intervals.

(7) While moving object appeared to have a tail similar to a comet or falling star.

(8) No sound was associated with observation.

(9) Other pertinent or unusual features: Observer states that he believed object to be considerably brighter than the Echo satellite was on previous observations (by himself).

b. Course of Object: (Azimuths recorded from TV antenna rotor markings.)

(1) Observer states that he was attempting to locate the North Star in order to point it out to his companion when object was sighted.

(2) Angle or Elevation: Approximately 40 degrees from observation point, (when first appeared)

(3) Angle or Elevation on disappearance: 20-25 degrees NNW of observation point.

(4) Wavering or oscillating, intermittently hesitating then continuing on general NNW course.

(5) Object disappeared over horizon at approximately 2240 hours (Local) (0440Z), 1 May 62. Light faded in intensity as it moved away from observer, and was barely visible upon disappearance over the horizon.

(6) Object was visible for a period of 35 minutes.

c. Manner of Observation:

(1) Ground-visual

(2) No optical aids. Observer has uncorrected 20 - 20 vision.

(3) Sighting made from stationary point on ground.

d. Time and Date of Sighting: 0405-0440Z, 2 May 1962 (2205-2240 Local, 1 May 1962). Observer states that night was very dark - no moon light.

e. Location of Observer: 3113N/9228W (Point in West Central portion of the city of Alexandria, Louisiana).

f. Identifying Information on Observer: Civilian, [REDACTED] St., Alexandria, Louisiana. Student (part-time) LSU Alexandria. Estimate intelligent, reliable observer.

g. Weather and Winds-Aloft Conditions at Time and Place of Sighting:

(1) Observer's account of weather: "Dark, but very, very clear night with an occasional wispy cloud."

(2) Report from nearest AWS or U.S. Weather Bureau:

(3) Ceiling: Unlimited

(4) Visibility: 15 miles

(5) Cloud cover: None (clear)

(6) No thunderstorms in area and quadrant of sighting.

(7) Temperature gradient: 3 degrees per 1000 ft.

h. No unusual natural phenomenon noted which could account for sighting.

i. No interception or identification action taken.

j. Check with surveillance activities revealed no flight activity equating to area of sighting.

k. This report has been prepared by SSgt Royce G. Borden, Intelligence Operations Specialist, 401st Tactical Fighter Wing, England AFB, La.

COMMENT: Preliminary analysis indicates that observed object was very probably an airborne balloon, possibly of the type used by weather surveillance activities for taking "Pi-Ball" reading with ground instruments.

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
