Dear sir.

I am enclosing some fragments of a substance which my brother and I believe to be a meteorite, that we found five miles east of Priest Lake.

We were working in the woods at the time and on the evening of the fifth of September we left our equipment at the base of a tree. The next morning when we went to work, we found the substance close to our equipment, it had not been there the evening before.

While it had landed the tree needles and other of the usual debris of the woods had been charred black, although they were very damp from rain.

It somewhat resembles a coal clinker, but a clinker is usually glassy and heavier than this substance.

Also there was no coal burning thing within miles of where we found it, so no coal residue could possibly been deposited there while it was hot enough to burn what it fell on.

It fell with considerable force as it made a dent in the ground about an inch and one half deep, and scattered the small fragments which we are sending to you over several feet of ground.

We have a piece three and three-fourth inches

long, two and a half inches wide and one and one half inches thick, and several small pieces.

We would have sent it to you long ago but we were not sure that you would be interested, as there is so many fake things claimed to be found.

We are very certain that the substance which we are sending to you fell from the sky. It also would have had to fall from an easterly or north-easterly direction, or it would have hit trees from any other direction and would have been completely broken up.

If you find that it is a part of a meteorite or of some other thing will you please let us know.

Rancher Sees Hovering Object

A. V. Gray, dairy rancher in the Chico district near Orland, California, reported to the Sheriff's Department that he had seen a strange saucer-shaped object hovering over an alfalfa field in September of 1961. The article containing the information was written by Fred Green in the Chico Record but he could not find the paper and the name of the writer was not recalled by the reader. We could appreciate this information.

Gray reported that he went to the field to shut off pump irrigation as a favor to a friend, John Gilmore, the owner. As he arrived, between 2:45 and 3:00 p.m., he saw the lights, thought it was a car parked there. As he drove over the field he discovered the object was not a car, but an object about 20 feet in the air. It had two lights, one on each side which seemed to be shining on the ground. It made no noise.

Gray had difficulty seeing the object's shape, but said it was oblong in shape. Its edges blunt-shaped. The lights seemed to protrude from the main body. Gray moved toward the object, got within 50 yards of it when it moved toward him, skimming the ground, then it dipped off into the southwest. In three or four seconds it was out of sight. Then it came back again, finally veering off east toward Chico.

The object, while hovering, was occasionally silhouetted by lightning behind it, and Gray said it was an eerie sight. He said it was extremely fast, and didn't resemble anything he had ever seen. He further commented that the noise was a swishing sound. Note that the object was in the vicinity of a pumping apparatus and irrigation ditches.

.....On the evening of September 2nd, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Bacigalupo of Chicago, Illinois made a close sighting. They were sitting on the porch of their home when they saw a huge saucer, lit up from the inside, with a row of red lights around its center. It was flying slowly just above the tops of the trees.

San Juan, Argentina

On the night of September 3rd, a farmer named Juan Sosa was riding home on his bicycle, in a sparsely-settled part of the province of San Juan, Argentina, when he saw a flying saucer take off from a field about 300 yards from the road. As it took off, it left behind a strong bluish light. Sosa gathered together several friends, all of whom had seen the UFO in the sky earlier in the evening. Together, they all went back to the landing spot with flashlights, and found that the ground was burned in the shape of a circle three yards in diameter. - The same object or a similar one was also seen by two Naval officials in the province of San Juan.
