HANDING, INFORMATION OFFICER, ELLINGTON AFB: A CHECK OF THE HOUSTON ARE REVEALED THAT TWO PILOTS OF CIVILIAN AIRCRAFT TAXIING AT HOUSTON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT HAD SIGHTED A SIMILAR OBJECT OF THE SAME GENERAL DESCRIPTION AND AT THE SAME TIME. THE PILOT OF THE ONE AIRCRAFT SIGHTING THE OBJECT THOUGHT IT WAS A METEOR. THE NAMES AND AIRCRAFT NUMBERS WERE NOT RECORDED BY THE TOWER OPERATOR AND ARE THEREFOR NOT AVAILABLE FOR THIS REPORT.
