SUBJECT: Report of Unidentified Flying Object (UFO)

9 OCT 1963

1. Reference AFR 200-2.

2. The following UFO sighting was reported at 1900, 5 October 1963, to the SSD Command Post, Inglewood, California:

- a. Description: A large silver object, described as having a slight bluish florescence. Four lights appeared to be located in the "middle."
- b. Course: North, traveling at a high rate of speed at approximately 5,000 feet.
- c. Manner of Observation: Visual.
- d. Time and Date: Dusk on 5 October 1963.
- e. Location of Observer: "Eagle Rock," near Pasadena, California.
- f. Observer: [REDACTED] age 12½. No address or phone number obtained.
- g. Weather Condition: Clear, 5 miles at dusk.
- h. Unusual Activities: None.
- i. Identification Actions: None.
- j. Air Traffic: Usual commercial and military traffic from several airports in the Los Angeles Complex.
- k. Preparing Officer's Position and Comments:
 - (1) Emergency Plans Officer, SSD.
 - (2) The sighting was reported as two glimpses as the view of the observer was obscured by both the haze and the setting sun. Inability to contact the observer precluded investigation for additional details. The location indicates that the object was an aircraft climbing on a north-northeast heading from a Los Angeles airport.
