15. SUMMARY:

Mrs. [REDACTED] contacted Police Headquarters and stated that she, her husband and some friends had observed a bright object, which appeared to be like a shooting star except considerable larger, traveling at an undetermined altitude in a Westerly direction. The object was a brilliant blue white traveling at what appeared to be a high rate of speed following the curvature of the earth, then descending sharply out of sight. Mr. [REDACTED] stated that the object was visible for approximately 2 to 5 seconds. The object was observed by the naked eye at approximately 2100 hours, 28 June 1965.
