UFO Sighting Reported by Nun

RINGWOOD, N. J., March 11 (UPI).—The Mother Superior at Mount St. Francis Convent in this Passaic county town told police she spotted an unidentified flying object that appeared "like a kite on fire" early Friday near the convent grounds.

Mother Superior Veronic said the "unusually bright" object was flying above the nearby abandoned Ringwood Mines. Police searched the area but could find nothing.

A rash of other unidentified flying objects were reported two months ago at the nearby Wanaque Reservoir.

However, after careful reading of the
sightings of U.F.O.'s by responsible
citizens in the Exeter, New Hampshire
area, as publicised by a bona-fide
journalist Mr. [REDACTED]

I thought better of our early sighting

Also it might interest you to know
that one or two nights later several
of our employees at the Astor Inn,
in Northport Harbor, (Maine) reported
observing "One U.F.O." hovering over
approximately the "same spot" -
in mid air over the Jackson Cancer
Experimental Laboratories south west
of Bar Harbor, Maine... and later
veering, spurring or wobbly steering
itself slowly away from the area
and showing the same Red & White
Flicker ring lights; but emitting
absolutely No Noise or Sound, at
1200 feet. attested to by Miss Ann Dobson.

Incidentally, the Jackson Cancer Experi-
mental Laboratories near Bar Harbor,
Maine, utilized all forms of high
powered electrical, electronic and
radiation equipment in the labora-
tory's experiments, etc.

Question. Between August 27 and Sept. 3
1966, was there any abnormal or
unusual Dow Air Force Base Radar
Defense Detection Pick ups of "Boogie"
or unidentified Flying Objects???

Naturally at 1200 to 1500 feet, on a
almost starless night, we could not
pin point this unidentified object
in the sky. But because of its
hovering ability, plus emitting
no noise of any kind, plus its
"startling" capability to zoom off
out to sea, at an incredible
rate of speed from a motionless
position. (Each time, the Red and
White lights of the air craft flicker-
ed off and on five or six times
before veering off from its hover-
ing target positions.)

Obviously we did not feel concerned
enough about this incident to report
it to the Dow Air Force Base in Bangor
or to any local authorities. As both
myself and my Lady Companion, Miss
Dene Clarke are, or would like to
think we are responsible adults —
and not given to jumping to any
hasty conclusions... However, the be-
havior (flight pattern) of this V.F.O.
or whatever it was we agreed that
night upset us a little. But, even so,
we both chalked it up to being a
new U.S. Air Force Experimental Air-
craft assigned to the Strategic Air
Command Base at Dow Field.
As no report of this sighting was
ever reported or put on file by
us. After all, responsible adults are
not given to filing such V.F.O. Reports.

Unidentified Flying Object

On a very clear night last Summer, at Northeast Harbor, Maine where I am employed as a Night Auditor at the Asticou Inn, a summer resort owned by the Asti Kim Corp. of Northeast Harbor (Maine), I observed a Unidentified Flying Object hovering over the proximity of the Jackson Cancer Experimental Laboratories below Bear Harbor.

It was August 29th 1966.
At approximately 9:15 to 9:30 p.m. at the Boat Dock in Northeast Harbor that I and Mrs. Irene Clarke, a Secretary at the Jackson Institute Stock Brokerage Consultants of Boston (Mass.) — suddenly spotted what first appeared to be an "observation balloon" moving very slowly; but emitting a Red then white light flickering on and off "in some regulated sequence" — very slowly moving from the direction of Bangor (Maine) apparently with the air currents at approximately 1500 feet high — between Northeast Harbor and Bear Harbor, Maine.

As I said I immediately identified it as some kind of "observation balloon as it emitted" "No Sound."

We got out of the automobile we were
 sitting in to observe it better —
 When suddenly "it stopped!"
 Yes, it actually halted in mid air
 and remained stationary —
 just apparently hovering over
 what we later determined was
 the proximity of the Jackson
 Cancer Experimental Laboratories
 located in the out skirts of Bar
 Harbor, at 1200 to 1500 feet in
 the air. It just "sat there"...
 or hovered motionless, except
 for a Red Light that flicked on
 (and remained on) until abruptly,
 five to six minutes later, the
 V.F.O. suddenly sped off at a
 breath neck rate of speed out
 to sea only to return a few
 minutes later to hover motion-
 less over the same spot (the
 Jackson Labs.) and take off a
 second time at accelerated speed
 of between 900 and 1200 miles
 per hour "out to sea again."
 The Third Time it returned to
 hover over "that exact same spot"
 the Jackson Laboratories, it sudden-
 ly veered off towards Bangor
 on the Mainland, leaving Mount
 Desert Island at a slower rate of
 speed; in fact almost as slow
 in a veering, yawing sort of
 wobbly pattern of flight, emitting
 "No Sound" and flashing only Red
 and white lights at take off.

My own Leyman's theories... for what
they are worth estimate these numer-
ous U.F.O. sightings; particularly in
the New England area of last year.
strongly suggest "alien Space craft"
being pulled or attracted to strong
pin points of intensified electrical
and electronic utility, power sources
radar stations, defense bases, experi-
mental laboratories, etc. also, hide-
out areas... principally located in
isolated, sparsely inhabited areas
of our country. but strategically located
near our Big Cities and Air Defense
Bases (see enclosure) also, ironically
enough in isolated areas, sparsely
inhabited, but adjacent to huge
man made water reservoirs and
or abandoned or unused Mines.
The U.S. Air Force Intelligence Services
has information (classified) on
several reported cases of possible
attempts by these "alien beings"
to test and try emerging into
our atmosphere. But, as far as
we can determine, all attempts
thus far have met with failure.

In summation I can only sum up
my own personal experience of last
August 29, and attested to by a
"companion witness".
