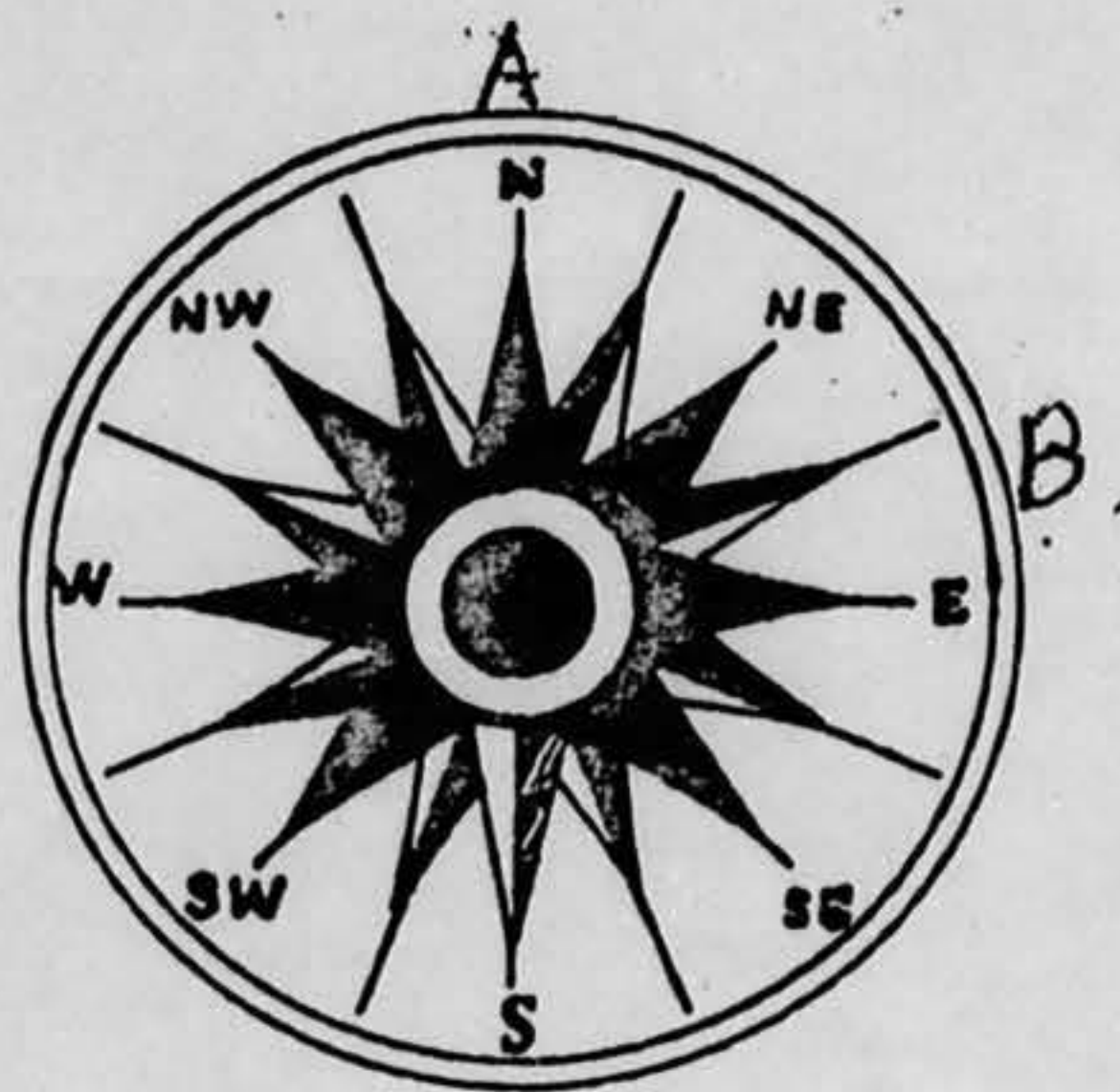
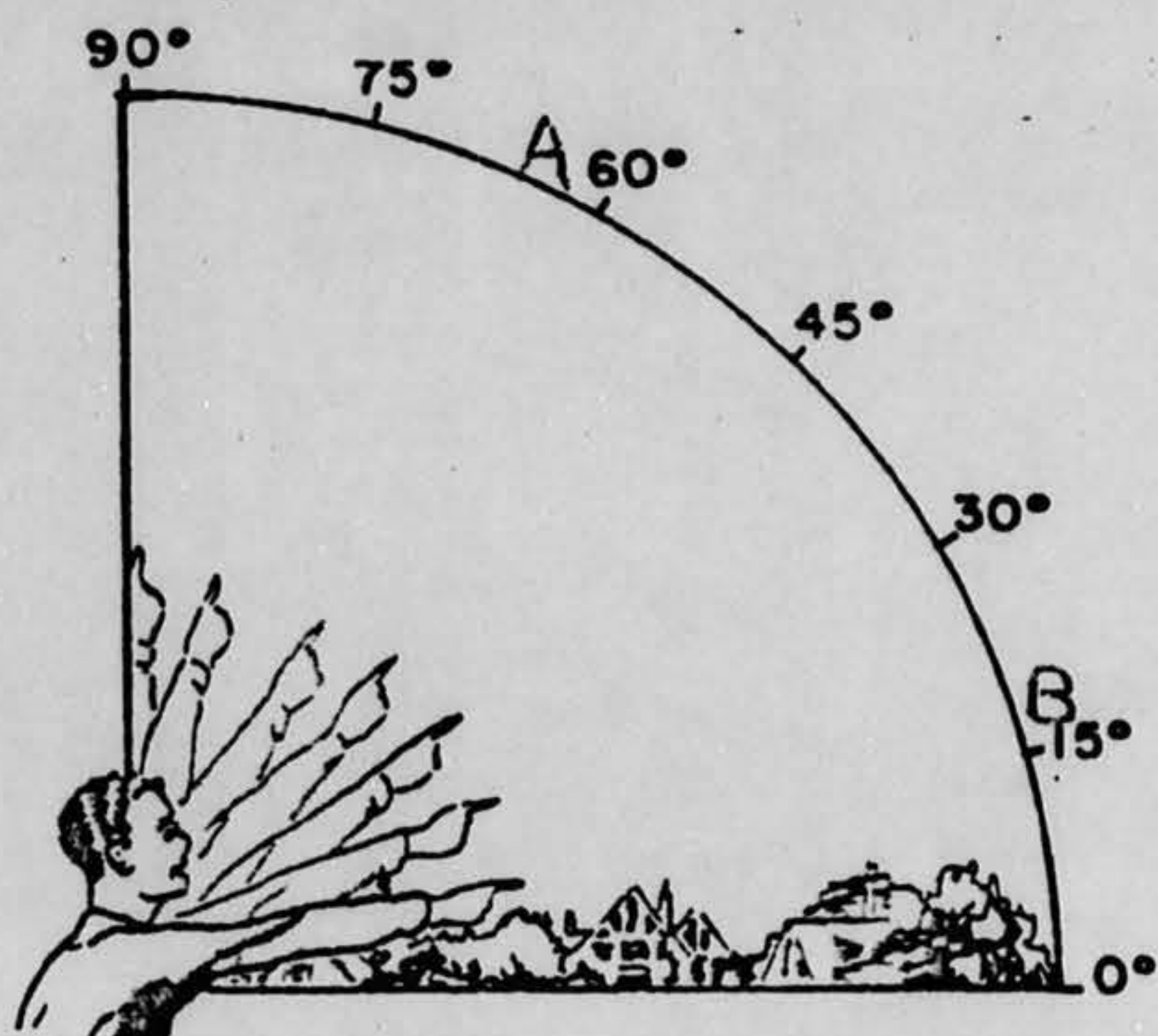

Dear Sir,

I am eighteen years old; an avid reader of UFO reports. I was sure it was a one in a million chance that I would ever see one. I did better than that.

I was in my back yard Tuesday, the twenty-six, about 7:50 P.M. I had my binoculars and telescope. I didn't have anything to do so I went out to look at the stars, moon, etc. The sky was absolutely clear. I glanced to my left. I couldn't believe what I saw.. I hurried and put the binoculars to my eyes. There was about twelve small bright dots. They were just as bright as stars. They flew in a V-shape as birds do, but weren't in a definite pattern. They were flying close together. Soon as I looked through the binoculars, I noticed one was lagging behind a slight bit; it rapidly caught up to the rest. They were traveling in a easterly direction.

I viewed them for only about ten seconds at the most before they went out of sight. For this reason I didn't have time to see their actual shape. I live near an airport and have never seen planes fly that close together and in that pattern. There wasn't any noise. They were pretty high and traveling very fast.

I told my parents and they believed me. About ten minutes later I called a local radio station, but they probably thought it was a joke. I don't blame them. There were no other reports. I seem to me that someone else in the city of Baton Rouge, La. would have seen them, but obviously didn't. I am sure what I saw was no airplanes, stars, or meteorites. I assure this is no joke. Could I please get some information on this.
