PREPARING OFFICER: JAMES R GRIFFITH, GS-9, GENERAL INVESTIGATOR,
SECURITY AND LAW ENFORCEMENT DIVISION, ROBINS AFB, GA. COMMENTS:
OBSERVER WAS POSITIVE THAT OBJECT OBSERVED TRAVELED FAR FASTER
AND WAS MUCH HIGHER THAN AIRCRAFTS. HE EXPLAINED THAT HE FIRST
OBSERVED THE OBJECT AS IT APPEARED TO PASS THROUGH THE LITTLE
DIPPER. OBJECT APPEARED AS HIGH AS THE STARS IN THE LITTLE
DIPPER AND FOLLOWED A STRAIGHT AND PARALLEL COURSE DISAPPEARING

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TO THE SOUTH. OBJECT TRAVELED THIS DISTANCE BETWEEN 5-10 SECONDS.
OBSERVER DID NOT BELIEVE OBJECT TO HAVE BEEN A METEORITE DUE TO
ITS PARALLEL COURSE ABOVE THE EARTH. OBJECT DID NOT APPEAR TO
BURN OUT, BUT FADED OUT DUE TO GREAT DISTANCE. LOCAL WEATHERMAN
REPORTED THAT HE BELIEVED A SATELLITE PASSES OVER EASTMAN, GA.,
TRAVELING NORTH TO SOUTH, AT APPROXIMATELY 2000 HOURS, EASTERN
STANDARD TIME; HOWEVER, HE BELIEVED THE SATELLITE WOULD PROBABLY BE
IN VIEW FOR APPROXIMATELY FIFTEEN MINUTES FROM HORIZON TO HORIZON.
OBSERVER HAS NO TECHNICAL/SCIENTIFIC BACKGROUND. L. EXISTENCE
OF PHYSICAL EVIDENCE: NONE.
