Other two objects remained stationary and were in sight for 30 minutes at which time observers got tired of watching them. Moving object faded from sight on course. Stationary objects were low in the west and were probably the planet JUPITER and the star SIRIUS. Moving object is consistent with an aircraft sighti <i>What sort of chief? 2. 1ST OBJECT: 20 DEGREES ABOVE THE HORIZON, 240 DEGREES T.

2ND OBJECT: 20 DEGREES ABOVE THE HORIZON, 245 DEGREES T.

3RD OBJECT: MOVING FROM 30 DEGREES ABOVE THE HORIZON
THROUGH 90 DEGREES TO TEN DEGREES ABOVE THE HORIZON. COURSE FROM
190 DEGREES TO 010 DEGREES T.

3. ALL EXCEPT THE MOVING OBJECT REMAINED STATIONARY THROUGH-
OUT THE PERIOD OF OBSERVATION.

4. THE MOVING OBJECT SEEMED TO WAVER RIGHT AND LEFT OF COURSE
AND LOOKED LIKE A FIREWORKS ROCKET.

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5. THE MOVING OBJECT FADED ON COURSE. THE STATIONARY OBJECTS
REMAINED VISIBLE UNTIL THE OBSERVERS GREW TIRED AND WATCHING THEM.
