Dear Major Quintanilla:

In reply to your letter of Aug. 4, enclosing four reports on objects seen night of July 13/14, 1966 from the Omaha, Neb. area, I have now gone over them carefully.

My opinion is that they refer to two objects, both quite obviously bright meteors i.e. fireballs.

The first has seven reports, for roughly 14/0400 plus Z, the other for 14/0800 Z-and that seems a very questionable one as to observed data. This last seems quite untrustworthy. As for the other seven, they seem to refer to same object going roughly from SW towards S or SE. The reports are more uncertain than usual, except for the excessive durations given by five of the seven. But if a fireball lasts over 10 seconds, usually people tend to exaggerate the duration.

None of the objects have UFO characteristics; you may safely classify them as meteors. You will be glad to know that I now have the preliminary path of the April 25 fireball. Thank you again for your valuable help in that.
