Dear Sirs:

At the request of the Office of Special Investigation of the United States Air Force, stationed at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport, we are writing this letter.

On Saturday night, July 16, 1966 between 10:30 and 11:00 PM, central daylight time, there were four of us (two schoolteachers, a housewife and myself, a businessman) sitting in our backyard when we observed in the southern section of the sky a light apparently traveling at a terrific speed. This light traveled in a north to northwest direction. This light appeared to be at an extremely high altitude, but, of course, it would be impossible to give any estimate as to what height it was.

When it was directly overhead, it appeared to have a green light in front and a rather yellowish light in the back. The light disappeared behind the trees in the northern portion of the sky, but previous to disappearing, it seemed to swerve slightly, as though it were about to turn. However, I cannot verify the fact that it actually turned. As I continued to watch the sky, a few seconds later another light appeared over the treetops in the northern sky, proceeding southward, and I can only assume that this was the same object originally seen proceeding in a northerly direction. When this light was directly overhead, it disappeared as though the light had been snapped off by a switch. It was an absolutely clear night, without a cloud in the sky.

This event in itself, I would have passed off, but the next night at approximately the same time, a similar object was observed in relatively the same position in the sky, its course being the same as the object of the previous night. As in the previous night, the object disappeared behind the treetops reappearing a few seconds later on a "return trip." This night, however, the light continued its course into the southern area of the sky and disappeared into a cloud flurry. The second night this sighting was seen by the original four people, plus an additional four, all of whom are responsible individuals. We would estimate that this unidentified object traversed a 30-45 degree segment of the sky in less than a minute.

The speed of this object, I would compare to that of a falling meteorite.

We hope that this information may have some interest to you.
