1. Shape: Shaped like a star, but was moving very fast. It appeared to be low on the horizon and was blinking.

I feel that he is sincere and accurate in his reporting but he is unable to offer any information that could be scientifically investigated. The object he has reported could very easily have been aircraft traffic around Stewart AFB. No other evidence to the contrary has been offered.
