5. LENGTH OF OBSERVATION Varied	11. BRIEF SUMMARY AND ANALYSIS Observer watched a star like object in the Southeastern sky for about 20 minutes. The colors were white, changing to red, green, purple and blue. The object was still visible after the 20 minute observation. The observer was out watching the stars when the object was noted. The description is consistent with that of an astronomical observation. Sirius with a stellar magnitude of -1.5 is quite bright and when low on the horizon is often mistaken for a UFO.

0435Z - Buckley Base Ops received following info from Denver Center as reported to that agency; Mr Earl Tube, 27, 25th St., Boulder, Colo, reported sighting a cigar shaped object (side view) and pear shaped (thought to be head on view) Southeast of Boulder for approx 10 minutes (0415Z - 0425Z). Color changed from red, green & yellow.

0445Z - A Mr [REDACTED], student DU, reported seeing same object as Mr [REDACTED] with same description.

**P.S. - I checked myself and could not locate object and the CQ on duty also checked and could not locate. (CQ is a qualified AF Weather Observer).
I talked to Sgt Williams at approx 0945 and object was seen from his back yard.**
