PUBLIC RELEASE OF UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS (UFO) FILES

These copied and redacted files of correspondence on **Unidentified Flying Objects** dating from 1952 to 2009 have been Declassified and released to the public by the New Zealand Defence Force under the Official Information Act.

Access to the original files held by Archives New Zealand is restricted up until the year 2080 for Personal Privacy reasons. These copied files have had the personal details of members of the public making UFO reports removed to preserve their privacy. Personal details of service personnel and civilians employed by the New Zealand Defence Force and other Government Departments and Agencies have not been removed. No other information has been removed or omitted from these files.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF FILES

Correspondence on Flying Saucers began in New Zealand Defence Force files in 1952 and continued under different names, Unidentified Flying Objects (UFO) and Unidentified Aerial Sightings (UAS) until the present. The files contain reports of sightings by private individuals and military personnel, investigations by Defence and other Government Departments and agencies into these reports, newspaper clippings on UFOs and letters from individuals who claim to be in touch with alien beings and craft.

While the files are in general date order from 1952 until the present some file periods overlap with one another and the documents within each file are not necessarily in strict date order. There can be duplicate documents within each file and copies of the same documents (particularly media releases and reports) can appear in different files.

These redacted files are available in hard copy from the Defence Library c/o Headquarters New Zealand Defence Force Aitken St Wellington. They are not available in electronic format.

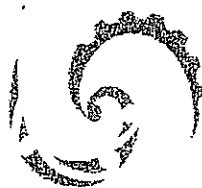

Please refer to your letter of 6 April 1984, requesting a report under the provisions of the Official Information Act concerning information on UFOs sought by Mr Harold J. Knapman.

I should say first that I regret our omission in failing to draw Mr Knapman's attention to his rights under the Act. This was simply an oversight, due in part to initial unfamiliarity with the Act during the first few weeks after it came into force, and in part because Mr Knapman is one of a number of "old friends" whose position on his favourite subject is thoroughly well known to us. In this case, familiarity perhaps led to an unintended breach of the new legislation.

Copies of some previous correspondence with Mr Knapman are enclosed. Of the four requests for information now at issue, the first two cannot be satisfied. As Mr Knapman has already been told, we do not hold any movie films taken by civilians in 1954 nor do we have any record of ever having received such films. The records of this Ministry and the Air Staff have been searched thoroughly. I am not familiar with the works of Michael Harvey, and have no way of establishing his credentials nor the basis for the passage Mr Knapman quotes from his book. And there is no record of a report by a senior WCO on UFO sightings at Whenuapai in August 1954.

Turning to the then Mrs Moreland's account of her alleged encounter with a UFO and its occupants in 1959, Mr Knapman again has been advised that the undertaking given her not to release this material without her consent is still in force. Copies of correspondence between this lady (now Mrs McCallum) and the Ministry in 1979 are enclosed, and these speak for themselves. In respect of Mr Knapman's claim that the assurance was made 25 years ago and that it now somehow lacks validity, the commitment was reaffirmed.

at her behest only five years ago. In deciding that that undertaking should be honoured, the provisions of the Official Information Act Sections 9(2)(a) and (b) were seen to apply.

As requested, copies of statements made by Mrs Moreland in 1959 and records of interviews with her are also enclosed for your information. It is easy to understand her wish to avoid further publicity. Mr Knapman claims to require the information for research purposes only, but the Ministry has no confidence that resurrection of the matter would not result in what Mrs McCallum would consider to be harassment. It was this possibility that was borne in mind rather than the confidentiality of her name for its own sake. After all, if we gave Mr Knapman the information he could well consider his undertaking to us to be no more binding than ours to her had been - and he says he knows Mrs Moreland's new name and address.

Mr Knapman has finally asked variously for a copy of the RNZAF report into the alleged UFO sightings at Kaikoura in late 1978 and for a report on a specific reconnaissance flight conducted on 2 January 1979. The main report was summarized in a press release at the time, containing all of the salient findings of the enquiry. The reconnaissance flight of 2 January yielded no further positive information. It was therefore believed that in passing a copy of the press release to Mr Knapman the Ministry had satisfied the requirements under the Official Information Act Section 16(e). Copies of the main report and of the press release are enclosed for your information. I should add that until now, the main report has not been released to any agency or person outside the Ministry of Defence.

Naturally, the RNZAF has an underlying responsibility for the security of New Zealand airspace. Its attitude to UFOs however is not dissimilar from that of the United States Air Force which since about 1970, I am told, has worked to the policy that "reports of unidentified objects entering United States airspace are of interest to the military as a regular part of defense surveillance. Beyond that, the US Air Force no longer investigates reports of UFO sightings". It may be pertinent to note too that in 1977 in a statement attributed to NASA it was concluded: "... what exists is a baffling collection of intriguing anecdotal evidence for mysterious phenomena, usually referred to as UFOs". There is no evidence I know of that establishes UFOs as a fact.

The RNZAF is not and has never been required as a matter of course either to investigate UFO sightings, nor to collate reports forwarded to it. This of course is a question of policy for the Government to decide, but the Ministry's advice would be that proposals such as the one made by Mr Knapman should not be entertained. So far as I am aware, only in one case - that of the "Kaikoura Incident" of 1978-79 - has the Government directed that

the Air Force conduct an investigation. Nonetheless, in discharging its general responsibilities the RNZAF continues to receive reports from the public (as I believe do the Police and the Ministry of Transport), and these are sometimes "investigated" to the extent of determining whether the reported phenomenon could reasonably be collated with a known physical event. These could include: a meteorological balloon reflecting a flash of sunlight from high altitude as it moves out of the Earth's shadow after dusk on the surface, or an unusually bright planet or star near the horizon, or anomalous propagation of bright lights on the surface, and the like. Generally, as with the Kaikoura report, only the results and not the details of the investigations have been made public.

Some reports of sightings come from those who are genuinely puzzled about something they have seen, and are made in good faith. Others are taken up by those for whom UFO's it seems will explain all the mysteries of the universe. Their diligence on the subject is not matched by any sense of balance or of the need for dispassionate enquiry. The Ministry should not in my view willingly get drawn into the pursuit of chimera and should avoid providing fuel for fevered imaginations.

Even with the more balanced observer, great difficulties arise. An investigation almost always reaches a point where it has at least to be implied that the observer had been fooled by some natural event. Challenging the reliability of his physical senses, which he has had no cause to doubt hitherto, can very easily turn an objective discussion into a subjective one. The main issue of whether or not there was a UFO tends to become lost as the observer perceives a need to defend a personal position, especially if, as is often the case, the matter has become public. In this kind of debate surrounding the reported experiences of others obsessions tend to be given free rein. Imaginative theories seem to blossom, including accusations of official conspiracy to cover up vital "facts", no matter how much information is released.

The case of Mrs Moreland illustrates the potential for misunderstandings. It might indeed seem in retrospect (with only the 25-year-old written word to go by) that in these matters even the investigators sometimes find it difficult to maintain their detachment. It is difficult not to conclude that the investigating officer most closely involved might have allowed his obvious interest to reflect and to strengthen Mrs Moreland's convictions (although in mitigation I seem to recall that "UFO scares" were rampant at the time). We shall never know. But I doubt that that officer - who went on to complete a successful career as an engineer in the RNZAF - would care to be reminded now of the episode, any more than does Mrs McCallum.

There seems to me to be an obvious need to protect the privacy of individuals in cases such as this one. They should not be exposed

to public ridicule, and a statutory power to protect them exists under Section 9(2)(a) of the Act. I should not think it reasonable to expose Mrs (Moreland) McCallum to the attentions of organisations such as Mr Knapman's (and it is her express wish that this not happen). This would I suggest be the consequence if we established a precedent which had the effect automatically of making UFO reports and perhaps their sources the property of third parties through the workings of the Official Information Act.

A second point also turns on the predilections of the eccentric hobbyist and the more extreme believers in visitations from outer space. It seems more than likely that any item of information, positive or negative, will be pored over with great enthusiasm. If they were given unrestricted access to Defence files - and I suspect that the effects on the Police and the Ministry of Transport would be similar - I can envisage a flood of demands for information that we do not have, and for explanations that we cannot give. This could also impinge upon staff and other resources, where allocations have to be made in the light of the reasonable and realistic security needs of the country. The 1983 Defence Review makes no provision for defence against extraterrestrial threats. The resources allocated to try to meet defence problems closer to home will as it is be stretched. It would in my view be contrary to the public interest to allow pointless diversion of the resources of a department of State: the provisions of Section 9(2)(b) would seem to apply.

In summary, the first two of Mr Knapman's requests cannot be met and the third request was declined in the light of Sections 9(2)(a) and (b) of the Official Information Act. As to the further request, I trust you will agree that for good reasons the Ministry has not seen fit to satisfy it in all respects; that the Defence files on the subject should not be opened up; and that the administration of the provisions of the Official Information Act as they affect this particular subject should be applied with a large measure of common sense as well as in the spirit of the law. I should add that I would certainly not envisage any change in the present practice of making freely available summaries of the findings where reports of UFOs are investigated.

Should you feel it to be necessary, I would be only too happy to have a member of your staff examine our files here in order to obtain more detailed background to the question of UFO reports and investigations.

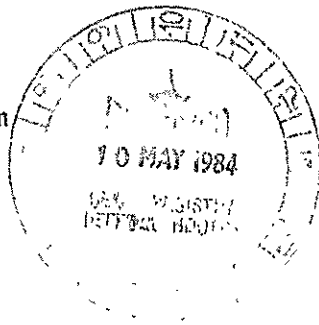

Dear Mr McLean,

I have received a request from Mr H.J. Knapman, on behalf of the Mutual UFO Network Inc, Box 22-638, High Street, Christchurch, to investigate and review the decision by Squadron Leader P.J. Lynch under the Official Information Act on 17 November 1983 not to make available information he had requested.

I understand the circumstances to be as follows. On 17 September 1983 Mr Knapman asked for the following information:-

1. A copy of the report on several movie films taken by civilians in April 1954 which were made available to the Air Force and, if possible, copies of these films.
2. A copy of a senior NCO's report on UFO sightings at Whenuapai on 18 August 1954.
3. The report on Mrs F. Moreland's sighting of a UFO on 13 July 1959.
4. The report by the Air Force on 2 January 1979 of a UFO sighting at Kaikoura.

On 17 November 1983 Squadron Leader P.J. Lynch replied that the Ministry of Defence had no record or copies of the 1954 movie films to which Mr Knapman had referred. Secondly, he said the Ministry did not have a report or any information on the sighting which Mr Knapman attributed to a senior NCO at the RNZAF base at Whenuapai in August 1954. He commented that the report on the sighting by "Mrs F. Moreland" in 1959 was confidential, and an assurance had been given to the witness by the Secretary of Defence that the results of the enquiry would not be released without her permission. He added that the witness had been contacted and she had requested that

her privacy be respected. He said that the report would not be made available. He also provided a copy of a press release relating to the reported Kaikoura sightings between December 1978 and January 1979.

Mr Knapman has made the following comments. In respect of his first request, he says the Ministry were definitely given movie films in 1954. His source of information is Michael Hervey's book "UFOs over the southern hemisphere", first printed in 1975. At page 220 it states:-

"During April 1954 the N.Z. Air Force received several movie films taken by civilians showing strange, mysterious pinpoints of light moving across the sky. They were duly examined by experts who later admitted that they had been unable to trace their origin, or offer any explanation as to what could have caused the lights in the sky".

Mr Knapman accepts the Ministry's reply on the second item of information he requested. He is dissatisfied with the decision on his request for the report on Mrs Moreland's sighting in 1959. He says that although he knows Mrs Moreland's present address and new married name, he respects her privacy and will not contact her about her sighting directly. He says he gave the Ministry an assurance that he would never pass this information about her to anybody. He says that the release of this report would be of great value to him, as it would give him a guideline and comparison to the other hundreds of cases he has investigated. He does not consider it reasonable that the Ministry has refused to release the report to him on the grounds of a request made by Mrs Moreland more than 25 years ago to keep it confidential. He recognises this was necessary for her protection at the time when UFO witnesses were harassed by the public. He adds that he has no wish to make public any information he receives from the Ministry.

Mr Knapman says that the fourth item of information he requested has not been provided. He asked for the internal report about the findings of the Air Force, following the Orion flight on January 1979 east of Kaikoura.

Finally, Mr Knapman has made a general comment that he would like to see the Air Force collating any UFO information which it is willing to pass on to UFO research groups without the necessity for the groups to state names, dates, years etc. before any information is provided. He adds that he has provided the Ministry with hundreds of UFO reports on micro-film. In conclusion he asks whether any arrangements can be made for authentic UFO research groups like MUFON to receive information for scientific research purposes.

I should also like to see the information requested and withheld, the papers supporting your views and those that were considered by Squadron Leader Lynch when deciding not to make the information available. In the areas where no information could be found, I should be grateful for your advice on the steps which were taken to locate the information requested.

Finally, I should point out that the Ministry has not complied with its obligation under s.19(b) of the Official Information Act to advise an applicant for information of his/her right to seek under s.28(2) of the Official Information Act an investigation and review of the refusal by an Ombudsman.

Dear Messrs Stauffer and Wishart

I refer to your letter of 20 March 1984 in which you ask for information from Defence files "on extraterrestrial space craft and or occupants that have landed or have been sighted in New Zealand territory". I understand too that you have separately requested from the Defence Public Relations Office details of the sightings of UFOs since the reported incidents around Kaikoura in 1979.

It is not possible to meet the terms of reference as you have phrased them in your letter. The Ministry of Defence holds no information whatsoever to suggest that aliens have landed in New Zealand, or that they or their spacecraft have been sighted here. I can assure you categorically that New Zealand Government agencies have not "dealt" in any way with extra-terrestrial spacecraft or their occupants. Neither has material suggesting that others have done so been provided to us by other Governments - I have not seen, for example, the declassified papers of United States Government origin that you mention.

By definition a UFO is an unidentified flying object. I know that some people claim to have identified these things and even to have consorted with aliens. I have seen nothing to suggest that those claims can be substantiated.

Distinct from claims of close encounters with sentient aliens, there remains the puzzle of sightings of odd lights and shapes. In this regard the New Zealand position is similar to that which I understand now pertains in the United States. It was NASA, I believe, that put it succinctly in 1977 by saying "....what exists is a baffling collection of intriguing anecdotal evidence for mysterious phenomena, usually referred to as UFO's". Also, I am told that "reports of unidentified objects entering United States air space are of interest to the military as a regular part of defense surveillance. Beyond that, the US Air Force no longer investigates reports of UFO sightings." In this country, however, the Royal New Zealand Air Force has never been required to investigate UFO sightings as a matter of course. (The Kaikoura case was a special one in which the Government asked the RNZAF to investigate, and

which was fully reported upon at the time.) Nor is the RNZAF or any other part of the Ministry of Defence required to act as a co-ordinating body for recording such sightings. I understand that reports from the public are received from time to time separately by the Police, by the Civil Aviation Division and the Meteorological Service of the Ministry of Transport, and by the DSIR. Some reports are cross-checked among these agencies primarily to determine whether there may be a physical reason for the phenomenon as it was observed - such as a large aircraft or a meteorological balloon catching the sunlight at high altitude after dusk or before dawn.

Turning now to your telephoned request, I can provide the following summaries of incidents which have been reported to the Air Staff.

On April 20, 1979, a single orange light was seen passing over Palmerston North. The light, when studied through binoculars, appeared to be an unflickering naked flame with characteristics similar to the flame of a kerosene Hurricane lamp. The light was first sighted at 1859hr at a height of about 2000ft travelling from Aokautere towards Hukowhitu. The light source was circular and large enough to present itself as a disc. To either side and above the disc was a small area of red light. The impression gained by the observer was of an oncoming aerially mounted 6 volt car headlight, shining alongside a red painted surface. The light gradually grew dimmer as it climbed higher travelling towards Pahiatua. It was lost from sight shortly after 1900hr.

Based on the description and behaviour of the light, RNZAF enquiries found that it had the characteristics of a radar balloon carrying a lamp attached to the radar reflector. That conclusion was supported by the Superintendent of Physical Meteorology and although a radar balloon had not been launched from Ohakea air base at the time it was not uncommon for these balloons to be found in the hands of others outside the Meteorological Service.

On April 26, 1979, several residents of Palmerston North saw orange lights traversing the city. A single light was sighted shortly after 2205hr over Palmerston North by the observer reporting the April 20 sighting. It was described as having a disc shape of yellow light surrounded by a thin corona of red light. It was estimated to be 8km distant and tracking along the watershed of the northern Tararua Ranges. It was visible until 2307hr. At 2230hr on April 26 a further sighting was made of an orange ball moving rapidly over Palmerston North. It gave the appearance of burning and pulsed from very pale to darker orange. As it moved away it showered sparks and appeared to dip and move from side to side. It was in sight for about five to seven minutes. Shortly after, three similar objects were sighted by

the witness in a shallow V formation in approximately the same position as the first sighting. The formation travelled from north to south over Palmerston North.

The characteristics of these lights were similar to the April 20 sighting with the light emanating from radar balloons.

For a week in December 1980 between 0510hr and 0600hr a bright object was seen in the east from Te Pohue and climbed slowly. It was only seen when the air was clear.

RNZAF enquiries into the sighting found that in all probability it was the planet Venus.

On August 13, 1980, air traffic radar at Ohakea reported an unidentified object 22 miles south of Napier.

Meteorological conditions at the time of the report indicated that the sighting was a radar return on a cloud formation.

On January 26, 1981, a lighted object was sighted approaching Christchurch airport from the south-east at 0449hr. The object travelled fast to the airport, manoeuvred and hovered overhead before departing to the south-east. The object, lit with a bright white light with an orange tinge at its periphery, was in sight for 14 minutes.

An illuminated meteorological balloon had been released at 0450hr and had moved after release to the west, south-west, south, south-east and then east in the first ten minutes. The balloon was a possible explanation.

On July 3, 1981, the Christchurch Flight Information Office of the Civil Aviation Division of the Ministry of Transport was advised of the sightings of an object near Cass at 2190hr that day. The object was described to be like a Newmans bus with bright lights of red/blue shades and was sighted manoeuvring below hilltops before moving off to the north-east. The weather was clear except for cloud patches around the peaks, and visibility was good.

No RNZAF or known civil aircraft were in the area at the time.

In February, 1982, a white light was viewed through a skyhawk window for a fraction of a second in Lower Butt. It appeared to flare out and gave no appearance of falling or leaving a trail of light.

Air Staff enquiries found that the light could have been emitted from any one of a number of sources - a momentary reflection of a car light, a bright meteorite or even a portion of space junk.

I trust that the above information will be of assistance to you.

Thank you for your letter of 17 September in which you sought details of various UFO sightings, under the Official Information Act.

Firstly, quite an amount of research and investigation has been done on your behalf but unfortunately we have no record or copies of the 1954 movie films to which you refer. Neither do we have a report or any information on the sighting that you attribute to a SNCO at RNZAF Whenuapai in August 1954. We have also checked records held by the National Archives but have been unable to find any information which may be of help to you.

With regard to the 1959 sighting by 'Mrs F. Moreland' I can advise that the report is confidential and an assurance was given to the witness by the Secretary of Defence, that the Ministry of Defence would do nothing to release the results of the enquiry conducted by the RNZAF without her permission. The witness has been contacted and she has requested that her privacy be respected and consequently the report will not be made available.

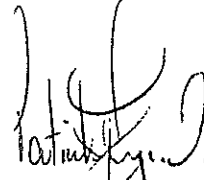

Thank you for ^{your} letter dated 28th October, 1983.
I was disappointed with your attitude regarding events
of '78-'79 in central New Zealand.

I notice that the sightings are now
'unidentified phenomena'. That makes a change from
data contained in the "Press Release" which was put
out by the Air Force. Do not lie, there is
evidence that what were seen were objects. It is
just that the Air Force was too lazy to collect it.
One such sighting being the Waikawa Bay event.

Regarding the principal witnesses. According
to the Rt. Hon. David Thomson, all the witnesses
on board the Argosy were interviewed including
the cameraman and the reporter. This is a lie,
they were never even approached. If you both
wished to lie, you have come to some arrange-

So apparently the Civil Aviation Division of the

I have been studying the UFO phenomena in Marlborough for nearly 12 years, and I can assure you I will not be cooperating with any Government Departments on UFOs.

It seems strange that the Air Force wants to spin all the hell it can ^{about} the Waikawa Bay event, when for a brief letter to

Dear Mr Thompson,

Thank you for your letters of 25 August and 3 October regarding sightings of unidentified phenomena in the Kaikoura area in December 1978. You will notice that I refer to 'unidentified phenomena' because that is precisely what I think these sightings should be termed. They are certainly unidentified and there is absolutely no evidence that what were seen were objects of any kind - only lights or light sources.

To answer your questions.

The RNZAF did carry out a thorough investigation of the alleged sightings. In fact the scope of the investigation was greater than any previous efforts made by the RNZAF to establish an explanation for sightings of this nature. The news service statement by the PRO(Air) stated that all the principal witnesses had been interviewed. That is precisely correct. All of the principal witnesses had been interviewed and any other witnesses, in the view of the investigating officer, would not have contributed in any substantial way to the investigation.

The investigating officer consulted with the Civil Aviation Division of the Ministry of Transport on a number of occasions while compiling his report. No reference was made to the alleged Waikawa Bay sighting because that was not in his terms of reference. If any comments were made by Woodbourne and Wellington Air Traffic Control about the Waikawa Bay sighting it was obviously not considered relevant to the Kaikoura investigation.

You have on a number of occasions stated that the Waikawa Bay sightings lasted for upwards of 55 minutes and yet Mr F.D. Macdonald who reported the sighting states in his letter to 'The Marlborough Express' on 20th December 1978 that the sighting lasted 10 minutes. Quite logically anyone making a comment on this aspect of that 'sighting' is going to quote

the principal witness (in this case Mr Macdonald) rather than any other source, especially if that source did not actually witness the sighting.

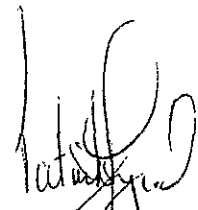
You can be absolutely sure that the RNZAF will not be investigating the Waikawa Bay sighting and will certainly not be re-opening the investigation into the Kaikoura sightings. All of the Departments involved in this matter are satisfied that it has been handled properly and correctly. The final paragraph of the Defence press release clearly defines the Ministry of Defence's stand on so-called UFOs. That is clearly Defence policy and unless absolute proof of anything to the contrary becomes evident then, despite the convictions or beliefs of anybody else, that stand will not change.

You have asked for a copy of the Kaikoura sightings report and a list of the ten principal witnesses and the time each spent in interview. Firstly the report is a restricted document and will not be released because to do so would compromise the confidentiality of the witnesses' statements, and in the same way providing details of each of the witnesses could see them being the recipients of unsolicited mail about a subject which they may wish to have nothing more to say. The times that each witness spent in interview was not recorded.

Reference in a previous letter to you by Mr D. Law, to a fee for work undertaken to give you this reply would normally apply, however as I am unable to give you any new information no charges have been made although considerable time has been spent in researching the background material.

I would like to point out that there is little purpose to be served by persuing this matter through the Ministry of Defence any further as we have no further tangible information which we can give you.

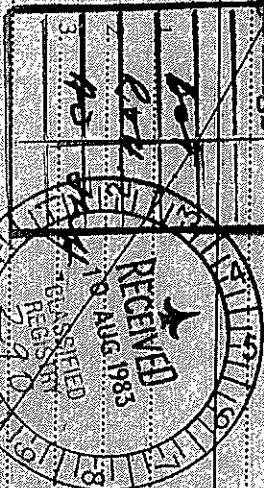

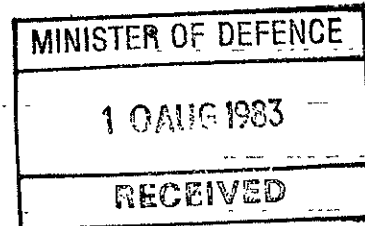

You will recall previous correspondence from me regarding the '78-'79 UFO sightings. Now that the Official Information Act is in force; I would like to know the following. Let's start with your letter to me dated 28th September 1981.

✓ How was it possible to carry out a thorough investigation, by the Air Staff, into the extensive Waikawa Bay sighting of December 17th 1978, when only a hairy fairy clipping from "The Marlborough Express" was used for the investigation?

X 2/ You say in your letter "... there is nothing in Mr. McDonald's letter to suggest that the object sighted from Waikawa Bay was other than a DC8 aircraft making its descent towards Wellington Airport..." If you thoroughly investigated Mr. MacDonald's letter he sent to "The Editor of 'The Marlborough Express'", you would have noticed the footnote the Editor put on end of the letter making it plain that extensive data was not published, (possibly due to space) I would like to know why you apparently used this as a way out, so ^{you} could explain

the sighting away as an aircraft.

- 3/ "...making its descent towards Wellington from the west." Why did you make that statement when the light was observed coming from the EAST?
- 4/ "The outline of events, which spanned no more than 10 minutes..." Why did you tell me this lie? If ^{you} had have investigated this sighting thoroughly you would have found the sighting lasted a good hour.
- 5/ How is it possible for a DC8 jet aircraft to remain visible for an hour when making an approach to Wellington Airport?
- 6/ "...desending over Nelson..." Observed from Waikawa Bay; the light spent ^{the 1st} 45 minutes (of the 10 minute sighting) coming from the direction of WELLINGTON. Why did you lie to me?
- 7/ "...usual inbound track to Wellington when making a southerly approach to the runway." What runway are you referring to? Obviously you are not referring to the runway at Wellington, perhaps you are referring to the grass airport at Waikawa Bay; as the light came back from Dumototo Bay, passed close to Allports Island, and then headed for Whatamanga Bay.
- 8/ "...most likely flightpath for its descent..." when taking the above into account; How did you ^{reach} this conclusion?
- 9/ "...Air Staff are sure that it was, in fact this aircraft that Mr. McDonald saw." How can

the Air Staff be sure? I will tell you the Air Traffic Control NEVER checked the events of the 17th December 1978, out. They just lied to you, straight out.

- 10/ I would like to know why the ATC lied to you so you could lie to me.
- 11/ "...enabled you to gain a fuller appreciation of this Ministry's position on the matter." How can I appreciate anything in your letter? It is the biggest pack of lies I have ever come across.
- 12/ "Accordingly, I do not believe any useful purpose would be ^{served} by engaging in further speculation about an event..." You are the one that is speculating. Why are you speculating without checking any of the facts out?
- 13/ "...for which a perfectly rational explanation already exists." What rational explanation are you referring to? A DC8 flying away from the airport it is coming into land at.
- 14/ I would like to know if Air Staff will make some attempt to investigate the Waikawa Bay sighting and get their facts straight, seeing no attempt has been made so far in this respect.
- 15/ In a reply to your letter dated 28th September 1981, I said that I would bring the dangerously flying DC8 to the attention of the President of the Airline Pilots Association. (This was the letter you could not answer because you could not find it.) The President

of the A.P.A. failed to get the joke when I told him what was in your letter. He never even smiled. Would you be writing to him explaining the joke, as he is having quite some trouble getting it? Then maybe he will be able to have a big laugh like you have had. His address is:-

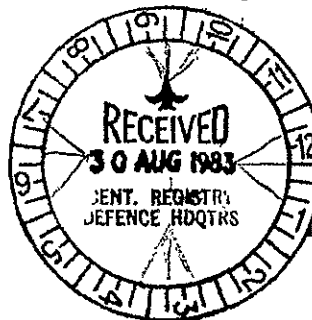

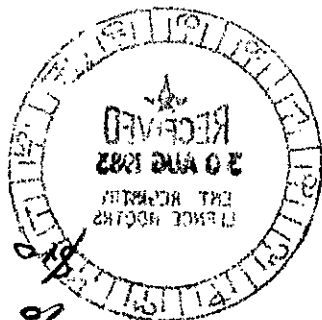

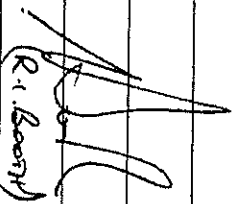

(1) To finalise my study of official investigations of UFOs, I wish to understand the involvement of other countries in the same matter:

(a) I would like to be advised of the extent and nature of the New Zealand Ministry of Defence UFO file holdings and that of any other agencies that may also conduct investigations in New Zealand.

(b) Do you have a yearly (or otherwise) summary or breakdown of reports recieved along with an indication of the possible explanations and whether a sighting is "unexplained"? If so, could I be sent copies of these documents?

(c) Should you have "unexplained" or "unknown" cases could you advise me what would constitute such a report?

(d) Do you approach UFO reports and their investigation from the point of view to evaluate whether a security threat is apparent, for public relation purposes, or perhaps to determine whether any body of "unexplained" reports constitute patterned data suggestive of unidentified and/or superior technology?

(e) Would it be possible to recieve copies of examples of the range of reports you recieve that you class as "unexplained" or some other similiar categorisation? I would only be interested in a few reports to compare with the type of reports evaluated as "unknown" by the RAAF. I appreciate that such reports would need to have the names and addresses of witnesses deleted.

(2) In particular I would like to obtain any documentation you may have on the following 2 events:

(i) Blenheim, July 13, 1959 - witness: Mrs. Moreland

(ii) Ngatea, September, 1969 - ground marks found on the property of a Mr. B.G. O'Neil.

Could you also advise me whether any other agency (eg. DSIR) conducted investigations into either of the above events? If so, would you be so kind as to pass on my enquiry re above.

Please refer to your letter of 19 August 1982 asking if I could direct the Blenheim Police to provide details of persons who reported sightings of UFOs in the Marlborough region early in August.

It is not possible for me to release the names and addresses of persons reporting any matters to the police, as it is not within my province as Minister of Defence. Also, I note in the newspaper clippings you enclose that the people concerned wished to have their identity kept private.

I am not aware of any intergovernmental act or agreement in respect of UFOs to which New Zealand is a party. In an earlier letter to you on 24 February 1982, I remarked that the RNZAF does not usually investigate UFO sightings although any material on these matters is passed to them for information.

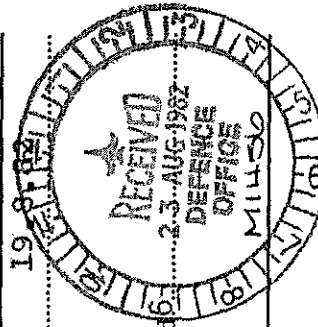

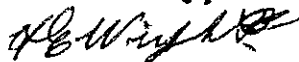

Mystery objects sighted at night

Blenheim reporter

Marlborough has once again become the favourite "stamping ground" for unidentified and mysterious objects visible only at night.

On this occasion, however, one in human shape has been seen on State highway 1, the other object seen airborne in the general area of the Vernon Lagoons near Blenheim.

The first sighting on State highway 1 was made between 12.30 a.m. and 1 a.m. on August 3, by the driver and two passengers in a car travelling from Christchurch to Blenheim. They saw an object about two metres high and with a general outline of a window dresser's model, standing just to the right of the centre line of the road, about half a kilometre south of the Hapuku bridge.

In describing the object later that morning to the Blenheim police they said that it had no distinguishable features, and glowed with a fluorescent light. They said that they drove right up to the object and passed within a few feet. When they looked

back it had vanished.

Senior-Sergeant J. O. Ireland said that the three persons who reported the incident were responsible adults. One of them, a woman, was still visibly disturbed by the incident when it was reported to the police at 3.30 a.m.

The second incident occurred at 12.15 a.m. on August 4 when a man travelling from Blenheim to his home in Amberley sighted an arc-shaped pattern of lights in the direction of the Vernon Lagoons while passing the Riverlands Montana winery.

He saw four flashing red lights in an arc, with two more red lights above it.

No shape was visible to the observer, but as the lights moved across the sky at a height of about 24 metres, the top lights changed from red to white.

The motorist told the Blenheim police that he at first thought the lights were from an aircraft, but became more interested in them when he realised there was no engine noise.

At the same time there was considerable radio interference which sounded as if several stations were coming in at the same time.

The Blenheim police got in touch with the Woodbourne control tower which reported that an Argosy had taken off about the time of the sighting, but had flown north and could not have given rise to the report.

A radar check was made over the lagoons area, but no object was detected.

The Blenheim police have not released the names of those who reported the sightings.

Another rumoured sighting early on the morning of August 3, also in the Hapuku bridge area, and also by northbound motorists, was of an object "like a big crash helmet," more than two metres high, hovering just above the road.

It was said that the occupants of the car had reported the "sighting" to Woodbourne air base, but a spokesman for the base said that no such report had been received.

Motorist shaken after seeing 'silver figure'

Blenheim reporter
A Christchurch motorist who sighted a shimmering silver figure on State highway 1 near the Hapuku bridge on August 3 would not return to that spot on the roadway, day or night, for "ten thousand quid."

The man, who did not wish his name disclosed, said yesterday that the figure had no distinguishable features or limbs. The lower part of the shape was either black, or the figure itself was hovering above the road surface.

He said he was sure the incident was not the result of a prank. There was a strong wind blowing at the time and nobody could have held a fluorescent object so high.

"I was terrified. I just don't want to see what I saw

again. I wouldn't stop near that place at night, or in daylight for that matter. It's no for me. I wouldn't take the chance," he said.

"It wasn't a flying saucer. It was a figure I saw. I just felt fear. I locked the car doors and just took off. Nothing could have caught me."

The motorist said the first thing he did on arriving at Blenheim was to telephone the Woodbourne R.N.Z.A.F. base. He had no coins for the call box and was put straight through to the security gate, by the exchange operator.

He said he was told by the person on duty that he should report the incident to the Blenheim police, which he did.

Thank you for your letter dated 24th February 1982. Unfortunately, you answered the wrong letter. I had already had a reply to that one. I was hoping you would answer the letter that I posted to you in the first week in October, 1981. I fail to see how my letter to you could have gone astray, as I usually put a return address on the back of the envelope. I wrote to you regarding your letter of 28th September 1981. There are a few points that need clearing up.

It is correct that Mr. MacDonald forwarded facts to "the Marlborough Express" regarding the Waikawa sighting. The "Marlborough Express" severely slashed this information from say 1/2 page right down to something approx. 100 millimetres small, and Air Staff based its investigation on a very severely slashed newspaper clipping. This is most interesting. Your letter mentions that the events spanned no more than 10 minutes; this is incorrect; the sighting lasted for approx. 1 hour, i.e. 12 mid-night to 1 am. 45 minutes of this time, it was coming from the direction of Wellington not Nelson. Also, when the light was coming back in

a southerly direction it was still over
the Marlborough Sounds. Hence the pilot was
allowing the WIDTH OF COOK STRAIT for side-drift.
Trusting this shows why I was most
dissatisfied with your reply.

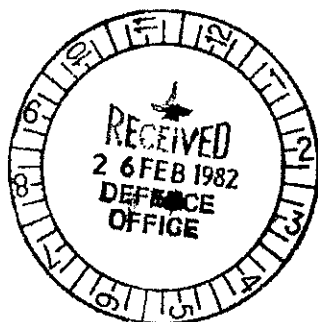

Temuka family sees a UFO

A Temuka man says he was tracked by an unidentified flying object as he drove home with his family from Pleasant Point on July 12.

Mr Ken Thew, a mechanic, said they told friends but did not report it earlier in case of being labelled an "idiot."

All the family must have sighted the glowing football shaped object at the same time but the first to exclaim was their 6-year-old daughter, he said.

"It had been raining earlier and I thought it was reflected light but it was clear at that stage. We wound down the window and it was quite obvious it wasn't a light but a solid object," Mr Thew said.

"It came up to within 120m of us. My wife panicked and put her foot down and we took off."

"I wanted her to stop but she wouldn't," he said. He estimated the object

was about 10m long and 5m high with an iridescent green top half and a red dish-gold tinged lower section.

A row of what looked like square windows emitted a strong light and something like a figure eight could be seen at one window.

"It tracked us for 12km and had the ability to move very slowly and very low."

"As soon as we got home I wrote a fairly detailed report."

"I asked the children to draw what they saw and we all came up with the same thing."

Soon after, Mr Thew decided to go back down the road and spotted the object over the sea.

When he returned home, the object passed over the house at about 300m and went east over the Milford Huts.

Last Tuesday about 7.30pm his wife and friends observed two similar objects over Temuka.

No light shed on UFO light in sky

Sightings of a bright, pulsating, orange and white light in the sky have prompted UFO fever at Christchurch Airport.

Four Air New Zealand cargo loaders -- all experienced with night sightings of aircraft -- are still scratching their heads over yesterday's UFO incident at the airport.

They saw a fast-moving orange light approach the airport from the south-east, then continue to move around directly overhead for about 14 minutes.

No aircraft was known to have been operating at that time and the object, or light, made no sound. There was a cloud cover and a slight breeze at the time, but the four men were convinced they were not seeing a reflected or refracted light source.

Lindway Squire, Gerald Coward, Bob Mulholland and Stuart McConnell had started work at 4am and were loading a Bristol Freighter bound for Dunedin when the incident occurred.

Mr Mulholland had just looked at his watch at 4.49am as he drove a forklift out of the cargo shed towards the aircraft waiting on the tarmac.

Seeing the bright light approaching at speed from the south-east he signalled to his colleagues to stop, and lights and engines were switched off.

"Then it was overhead," Mr Squire told "The Star." "But it wasn't stationary, it was hovering and moving around."

The light was circular with a white centre, a pulsating orange ring enclosing it.

"It went back to the south-east, then westwards, then back above us again."

At that stage Mr Squire went back into the cargo terminal intending to ring the control tower. He was unable to reach the tower and returned to the tarmac.

While Mr Squire was inside, Mr Coward and his two companions watched the object disappear to the east over the Cashmere Hills.

Mr Coward recalled the white light growing in intensity as the object hovered above.

After 14 years working with aircraft Mr Coward said he had seen all sorts of lights in the night sky, including falling stars, but "this was different altogether. It's a mystery to me."

Said Mr Squire: "I didn't feel scared. All I could think was 'Oh my God, what is it? I was just engrossed.' Mr Squire admitted to having read a few books on UFOs, but said he is not "into it."

The duty air traffic controller saw nothing from the control tower and police have only received one report of the incident -- from the airline staff.

"We just hope somebody else in Christchurch might have seen something," Mr Squire said.

The Meteorological Service has been unable to offer any explanation for the incident.

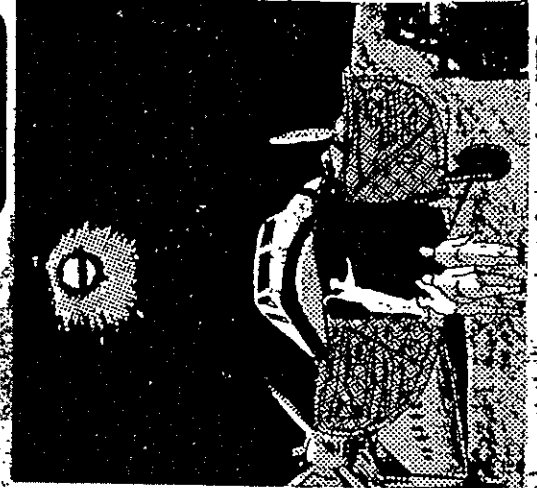
A weather balloon was released at the airport at 4.56am, but that was after the object was first seen and it would not have been approaching at speed from the south-east.

The Air Force, which received a report of the incident, was also unable to explain it.

Yesterday's was the country's first reported UFO sighting since a Temuka family said it was tracked by a bright object in the sky as it drove home from Pleasant Point on July 12, last year.

Mr Ken Tew and his family said they saw a glowing football shaped object. It appeared to a solid object 10m high and 5m long with an iridescent green top half and a reddish-gold tinged lower section.

The family reported seeing what looked like a row of windows, emitting a strong light. At one stage the object came within 120m of the family.

Spotlight theory on UFO sighting

Spotlight hunters could be responsible for Tuesday's reported UFO sighting at Christchurch Airport.

Gunshots were heard near the Waimakariri River to the north of the airport in the early hours of Tuesday and spotlights can be reflected by cloud.

The vice-president of the Canterbury Astronomical Society (Mr C. H. Rowe) said the object described by Air New Zealand employees could well have been a

reflected spotlight.

The effect, known as back-scatter, could produce an orange halo when seen through hazy cloud, Mr Rowe said today.

Mr Rowe admits that in cases of reported UFO sightings he tries for the mundane explanations first.

But two more witnesses to the incident have strengthened Mr Rowe's theory.

Mark Ley and Rodney Jones, both 14, were camp-

ing out near the Waimakariri riverbed at the time.

Mark said today how the pair were woken by a bright light — orange coloured — which shone from above on to their tent and surrounding trees.

They were terrified by the incident, he said.

Rodney had noted the time at 1.10am when he woke — more than three hours earlier than the reported sighting by airline

ground staff.

"We opened the tent and poked our heads out," Mark said.

The pair at first thought there was a fire, though they could not hear crackling but a "faint hum"

The source of the light was to the south of the tent and could not be seen over the treetops.

According to Mark the area was lit up for three or four minutes.

"We thought at first it

might have been a car or a spotlight, which is still a possibility, but the light never stayed in one spot.

"We just sat there for a while, then there were a few gunshots from behind us (to the north)."

"We were lying there terrified really — my friend said it could be a UFO," Mark said.

The pair managed to get back to sleep about two hours later, then woke early and cycled home.

I have had Air Staff reconsider the matter in the light of the facts presented by Mr McDonald in his letter to the Marlborough Express of 20 December 1978. Air Staff believe, however, that there is nothing in Mr McDonald's letter to suggest that the object sighted from Waikawa Bay was other than a DC8 aircraft making its descent towards Wellington Airport from the west. The outline of events, which spanned no more than 10 minutes, is entirely consistent with sighting a large aircraft approaching from a distance. It is estimated that on a clear night the landing lights of a DC8 aircraft descending over Nelson would be visible for at least six minutes before the aircraft passed away to the north of Waikawa Bay on its usual inbound track to Wellington when making a southerly approach to the runway. Knowing that there was a DC8 aircraft inbound to Wellington at that particular time and taking into account the most likely flight path for its descent, Air Staff are sure that it was, in fact, this aircraft that Mr McDonald saw.

I trust my comments have enabled you to gain a fuller appreciation of this Ministry's position on the matter. Accordingly, I do not believe any useful purpose would be served by engaging in further speculation about an event for which a perfectly rational explanation already exists.

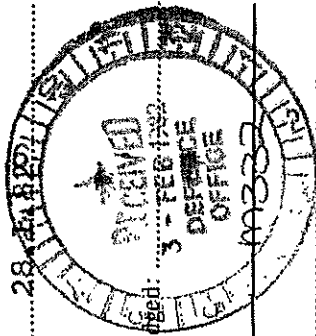

No light shed on UFO light in sky

Sightings of a bright, pulsating, orange and white light in the sky have prompted UFO fever at Christchurch Airport.

Four Air New Zealand cargo loaders — all experienced with night sightings of aircraft — are still scratching their heads over yesterday's UFO incident at the airport.

They saw a fast-moving orange light approach the airport from the south-east then continue to move around directly overhead for about 14 minutes.

No aircraft was known to have been operating at that time and the object, or light, made no sound. There was a cloud cover and a slight breeze at the time, but the four men were convinced they were not seeing a reflected or refracted light source.

Lindsay Squire, Gerald Coward, Bob Mulholland and Stuart McConnell had started work at 4am and were loading a Bristol Freighter bound for Dunedin when the incident occurred.

Mr Mulholland had just looked at his watch at 4.49am as he drove a forklift out of the cargo shed toward the airfield waiting on the tarmac.

Se. bright light approaching at speed from the south-east signalled to his colleagues to stop, and the sixth engines were switched off.

"Then it was overhead," Mr Squire told "The Star." "But it wasn't stationary, it was hovering and moving around."

The light was circular with a white centre, a pulsating orange ring enclosing it.

"It went back to the south-east, then westwards, then back above us again."

At that stage Mr Squire went back into the cargo terminal intending to ring the control tower. He was unable to reach the tower and returned to the tarmac.

While Mr Squire was inside, Mr Coward and his two companions watched the object disappear to the east over the Cashmere Hills.

Mr Coward recalled the white light growing in intensity as the object hovered above.

After 14 years working with aircraft Mr Coward said he had seen all sorts of lights in the night sky, including falling stars, but "this was different altogether. It's a mystery to me."

Said Mr Squire: "I didn't feel scared. All I could think was 'Oh my God, what is it? I was just engrossed.'"

Mr Squire admitted to having read a few books on UFOs, but said he is not "into it."

"Because of the way it moved, and knowing aircraft, I'm convinced it was a UFO."

The duty air traffic controller saw nothing from the control tower, and police have only received one report of the incident — from the airline staff.

"We just hope somebody else in Christchurch might have seen something," Mr Squire said.

The Meteorological Service has been unable to offer any explanation for the incident.

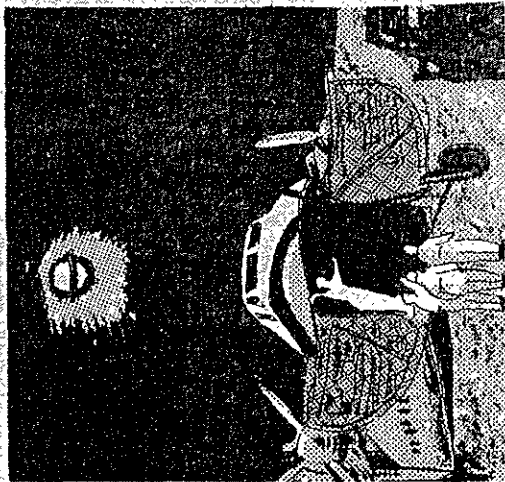
A weather balloon was released at the airport at 4.56am, but that was after the object was first seen and it would not have been approaching at speed from the south-east.

The Air Force, which received a report of the incident, was also unable to explain it.

Yesterday's was the country's first reported UFO sighting since a Tenuka family said it was tracked by a bright object in the sky as it drove home from Pleasant Point on July 12, last year.

Mr Ken Thew and his family said they saw a glowing football shaped object. It appeared to a solid object, 10m high and 5m long with an iridescent green top half and a reddish-gold tinged lower section.

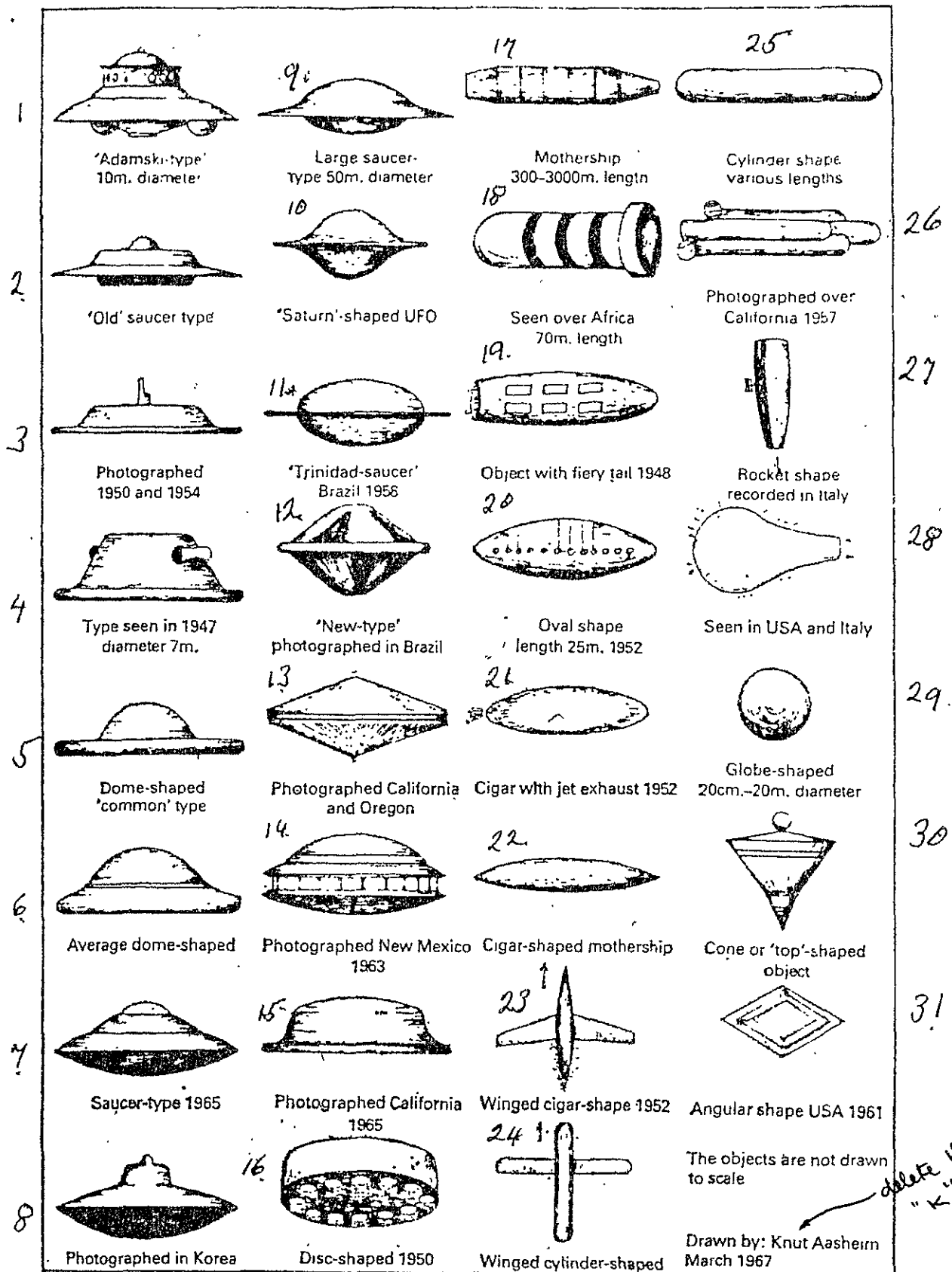
The family reported seeing what looked like a row of windows, emitting a strong light. At one stage the object came within 120m of the family.

The book's section on flying saucers is not especially encouraging for those determined to believe in them. "The trouble with U.F.O.s is that there are too many of them," remarks the author. However, the book as a whole is a splendid collection of scientific puzzles and unexplained phenomena from theories of continental drift, to the impression on the Turin shroud, to a careful map of the losses of ships and aircraft in the notorious Bermuda Triangle.

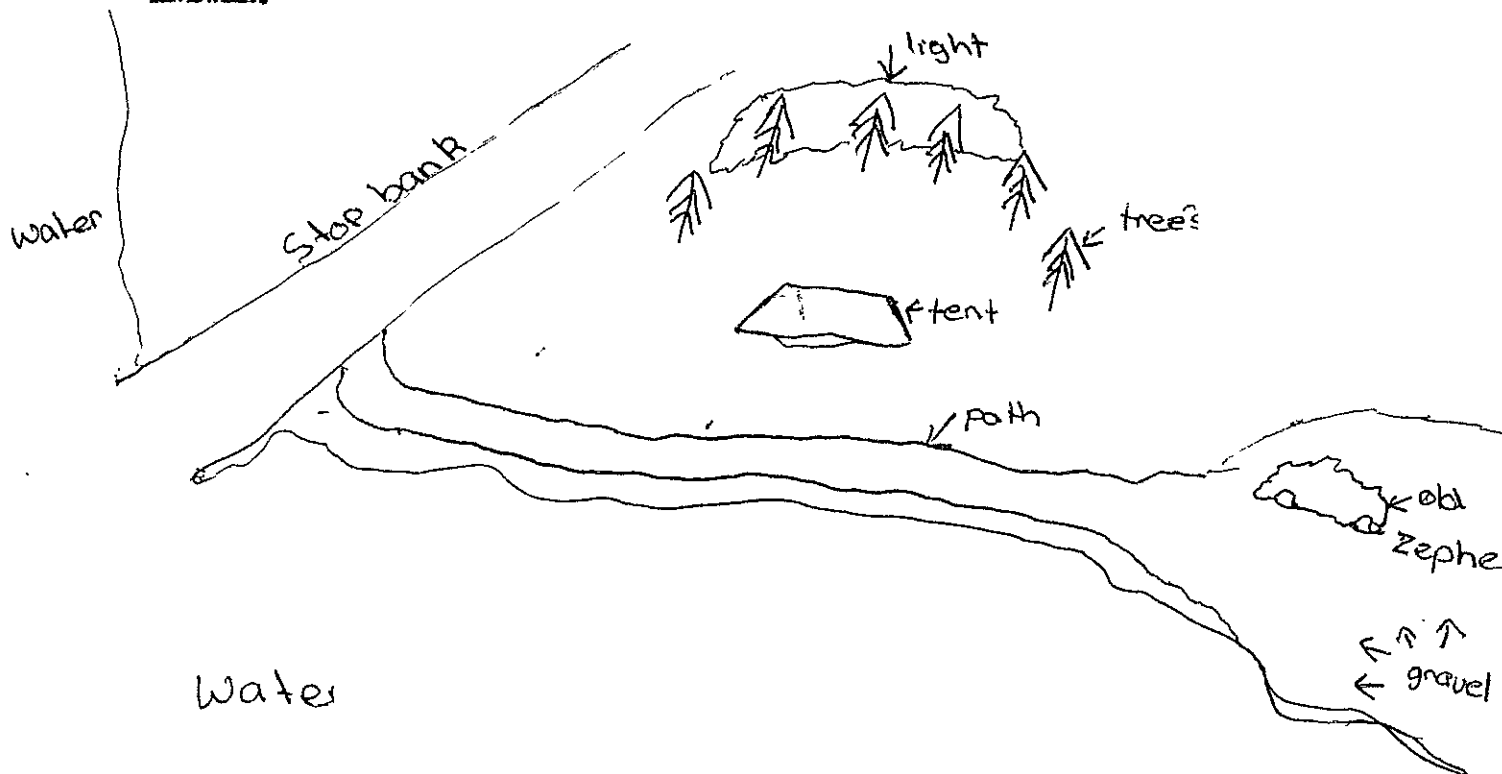

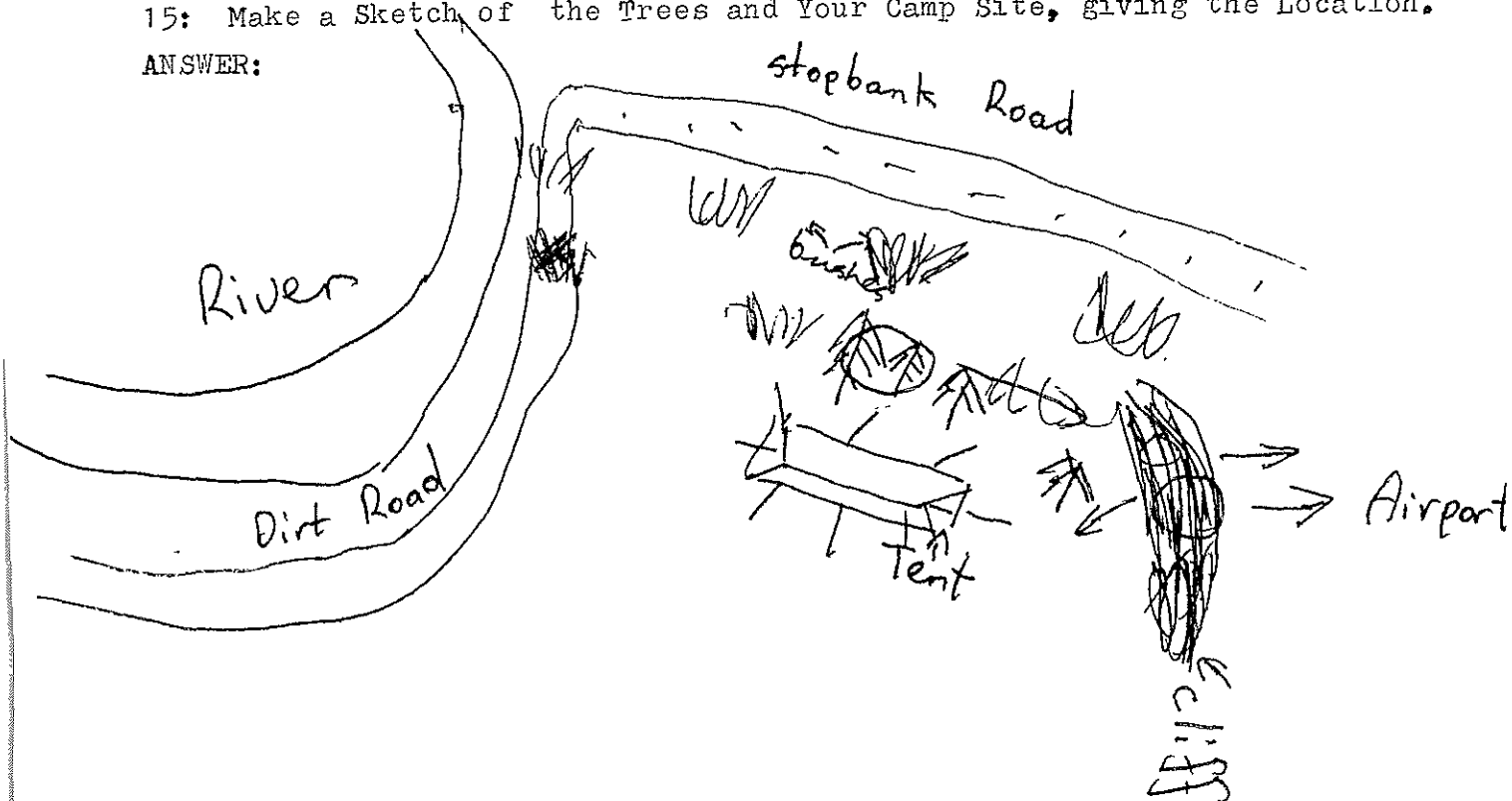

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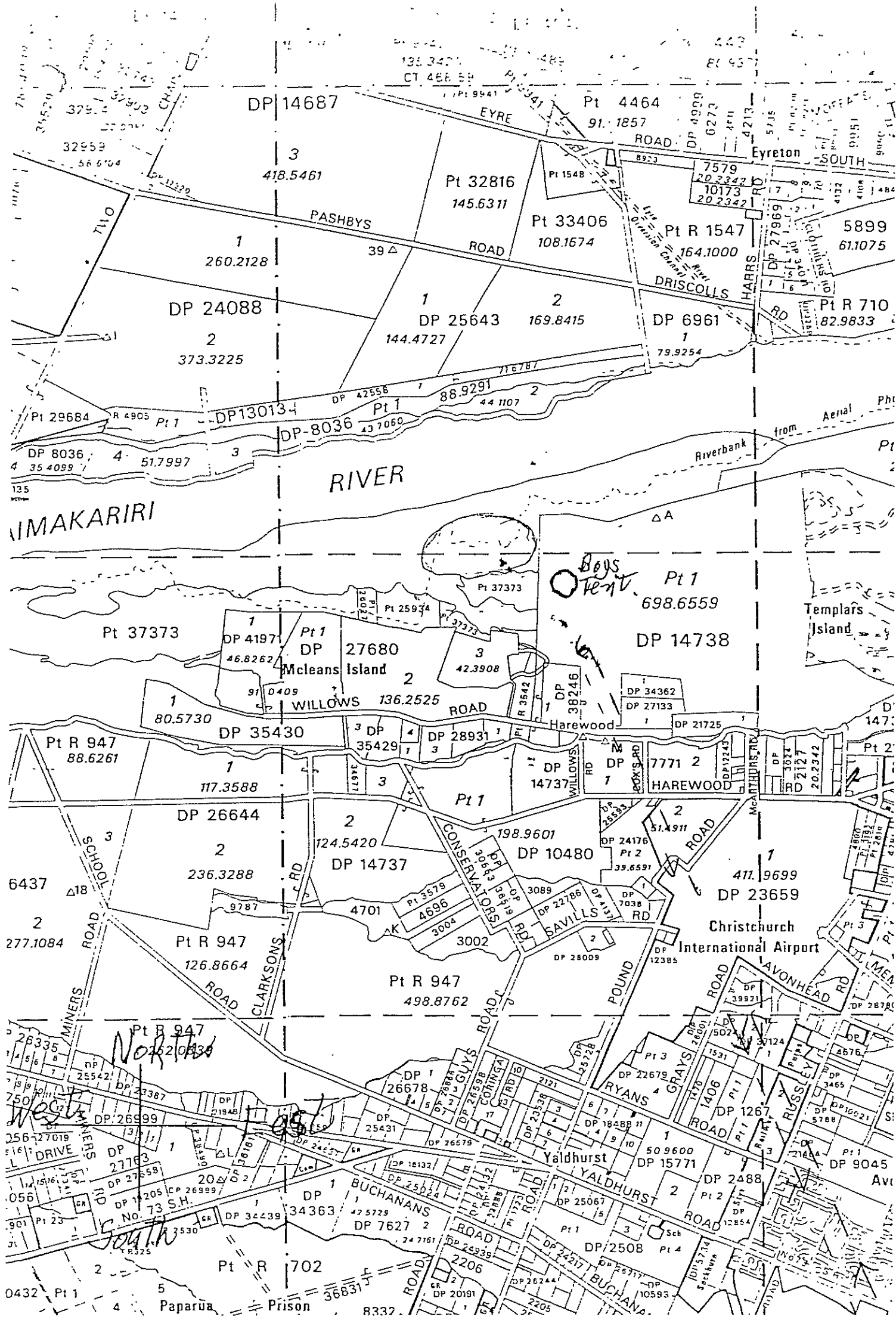

SPOTLIGHT THEORY ON U,F,O, SIGHTING.

Spotlight Hunters could be responsible for Tuesday's Reported UFO Sighting at Christchurch Airport. Gunshots were Heard near the Waimakariri River to the North of the Airport in the Early Hours of Tuesday and Spotlights can be reflected by Cloud.

The Vice-President of the Canterbury Astronomical Society (Mr C,H, Rowe) said the Object Described by Air New Zealand Employees could well have been a Reflected Spotlight. The effect, known as Back-scatter, could produce an Orange, Halo when seen through Hazy Cloud Mr Rowe said today. Mr Rowe admits that in Cases of Reported U,F,O, Sightings He tries for the mundane explanations first.

But Two more Witnesses to the Incident have strengthened Mr Rowe's theory.

Mark Ley, and Rodney Jones, 14, were camping out near the Waimakariri riverbed at the time. 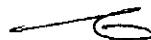

Helmeted Aliens Over New Zealand

At 5:30 A.M. on July 13, 1959, Mrs. Frederick Moreland was crossing the barn yard on her way to milk the cows. The Morelands' enjoy country living and the nine-acre farm which they maintain on Old Renwick Road in Blenheim, Marlborough, New Zealand, suits them just fine. Mr. Moreland is a civilian employee at the Woodbourne Station of the Royal New Zealand Air Force, and on weekends, Mrs. Moreland is a nurse's aid at the Lister Hospital.

Mrs. Moreland was sleepily going about her early morning chores when she noticed a green glow in the clouds. As she told local police and a reporter for the *Nelson Evening Mail*: "... there was no moon so I wondered what it was. When I was half way across the paddock, two large green things, like eyes or big lamps, appeared above me and dropped towards the ground.

"I noticed that I was bathed in a green light and that the paddock was green, too. It was a horrid sort of color. My first thought was, 'I shouldn't be here,' and made a dive for the trees (a stand of pine on the other side of the paddock). There I stood watching.

"A saucer-shaped glow with two indented green lights in the bottom descended. The air became very warm. Two rows of jets around the middle shot out orange-colored flames. They appeared to revolve in opposite directions. The thing was about 20 to 30 feet in diameter. It hovered at about roof height.

"The jets stopped and a light was switched on in what appeared to be a . . . glass roof or dome, which glowed.

STRANGERS FROM THE SKIES

The bottom appeared to be of a grayish metal color. There was a faint hum in the air as it hovered."

Mrs. Moreland's early morning marvels had not yet ceased as she noted next that "there were two men in it, dressed in fairly close fitting suits of shiny material. The only thing I can think of to describe it is aluminum foil. Opaque helmets rose from their shoulders. I could not see their faces.

"One of the men stood up and put two hands in front of him as if leaning to look downwards. He then sat down, and after a minute or two, the jets started off again and, tilting slightly at first, the thing shot up vertically at great speed and disappeared into the clouds. When it did this, it made a soft but high-pitched sound."

Understandingly, Mrs. Moreland admitted to local authorities that her experience had left her "dumb-founded for a moment." As she stood in the trees to regain her mental equilibrium, she noticed the "smell of something which resembled pepper in the air."

With feminine logic, Mrs. Moreland continued about her chores and finished milking the cows before she went into the house to awaken her husband, who had worked a late shift at the Air Force Station the previous night. At his insistence, she phoned the local constable and the local press. Within a week, she was re-telling her story to an investigating officer of the New Zealand Air Force.

UFO investigators have often puzzled over the fact that so many sightings occur in Australia, New Zealand, New Guinea and the Antarctic, and that so many of these same sightings include prolonged visual contact with the alien beings that pilot the UFO's. The aliens may relax their security when they are "down-under" because they are aware of the communications lag between that area and the rest of the world. Never have aliens remained in view for longer than the four-hour period recorded by Father Gill and his mission at Papua, New Guinea. Imagine the horror such an incident would cause if it were to occur near New York City, London, or Moscow. Air-raid sirens would blare and rocket-armed jets would be sent in pursuit.

Thank you for your letter of 20 September, seeking information regarding a film of a UFO sighting in April, 1954, and the report of a sighting by a Mrs Frederick Moreland on 13 July, 1959.

A search of our records cannot locate any reference to a film that was passed to the RNZAF for examination nor is there any reference to the sighting by Mrs Moreland.

With the exception of the Kaikoura sightings, the RNZAF does not undertake investigations into the sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects. It does, however, on receipt of a report of a sighting consult with other Government agencies such as the Civil Aviation Division, Meteorological Service and the DSIR in an effort to eliminate obvious causes. In many cases a logical explanation is found.

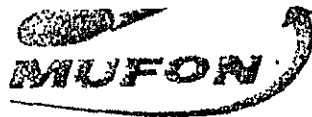

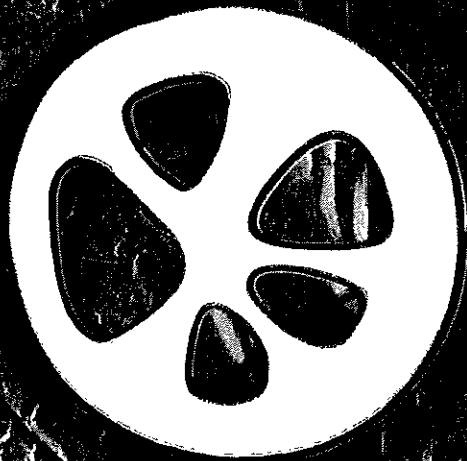

Thank you for your recent letter which has been referred to me by the Minister of Defence for reply.

I have had Air Staff reconsider the matter in the light of the facts presented by Mr McDonald in his letter to the Marlborough Express of 20 December 1978. Air Staff believe, however, that there is nothing in Mr McDonald's letter to suggest that the object sighted from Waikawa Bay was other than a DC8 aircraft making its descent towards Wellington Airport from the west. The outline of events, which spanned no more than 10 minutes, is entirely consistent with sighting a large aircraft approaching from a distance. It is estimated that on a clear night the landing lights of a DC8 aircraft descending over Nelson would be visible for at least six minutes before the aircraft passed away to the north of Waikawa Bay on its usual inbound track to Wellington when making a southerly approach to the runway. Knowing that there was a DC8 aircraft inbound to Wellington at that particular time and taking into account the most likely flight path for its descent, Air Staff are sure that it was, in fact, this aircraft that Mr McDonald saw.

I trust my comments have enabled you to gain a fuller appreciation of this Ministry's position on the matter. Accordingly, I do not believe any useful purpose would be served by engaging in further speculation about an event for which a perfectly rational explanation already exists.

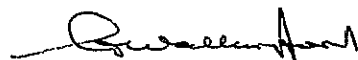

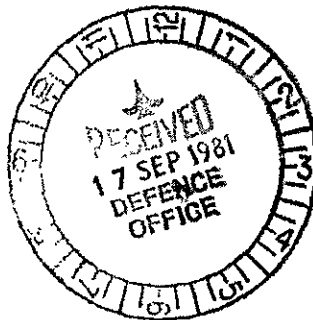

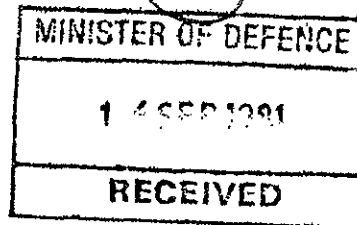

ODD THINGS IN THE NIGHT AT WAIKAWA

To the Editor

Sir, — While my wife was in our sitting room she noticed a brilliant light through the window. So bright was this light that she called me from bed to view it. The time was approximately 0.50 Sunday.

The light was suspended over the ridge west of Waikawa known as the Snout. It seemed to hover for a good minute and then moved on northwards, following the contour of the hill almost to the Snout and then hovered again for about half a minute, and then moved off towards the east very slowly and with an up and down motion.

For a time it hovered beyond Allports Islands (for about two minutes) and the brilliance dimmed down almost to a mere pinhead, then suddenly it flared up over 10 times brighter than any star. At this stage we could see the cloud-covered peak in the back of Kenepuru Sound beyond it.

After it flared up it rose suddenly and then fell in an up and down motion, travelling eastwards in an arc around the Sounds and headed towards Whatamango or Tory Channel; then it levelled off and moved at a terrific speed and disappeared behind the hills.

LETTERS

We called our neighbours out to witness the sighting of the u.f.o. The time of viewing this was for almost 10 minutes.

There was brilliant moonlight at the time and no wind and no other clouds in the sky and a very starry night. We heard no noise in this very still night.

I phoned Woodbourne control tower and was advised that it was probably a parachute flare. They rang the Picton police, who later phoned me.

So long was this thing hovering that I was able to view it through binoculars. Six light beams were visible in colour to the naked eye. A quarter circle looked like it was painted dark red. It appeared to me to be a manned hot air balloon.

This is the third time in two years that we have seen this, whatever it is. During this last winter our sitting room became suddenly lit up quite noticeably against the electric light and seagulls down at the beach started screeching and then took flight.

Going outside to investigate we saw the water in the bay

lit up dull red and a brilliant light hovering for some moments and then flash off towards the east in less than a second.

I know that this was not a flare, was not a plane, but could have been a helicopter, but there was no noise and the lights were too bright.

As for the Waikawa Bay sighting, the RNZAF confirms that Woodbourne Air Traffic Control received a telephone call at 1 am on 17 December from a Mr Frank McDonald who reported an orange brilliantly coloured light which he had sighted at 0050 hours and observed for three minutes at an estimated height of 500 feet in a direction toward Tory Channel to Port Underwood. Contrary to any impression of indifference that may have been gained by the caller, the air traffic controller did, in fact, first inform the Blenheim Police and, then, Wellington Air Traffic Control who advised that a DC8 aircraft was carrying out its descent towards Wellington at the time in question. In the conditions prevailing at the time the lights of this aircraft would no doubt have been visible to an observer in the vicinity of Picton and provide an explanation for the source of the lights as seen by Mr McDonald. 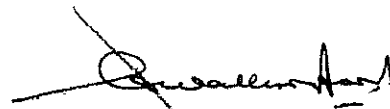

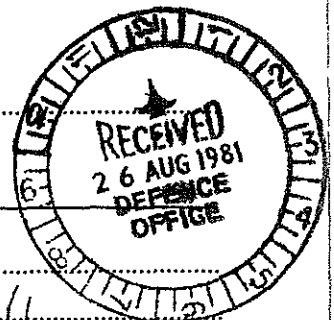
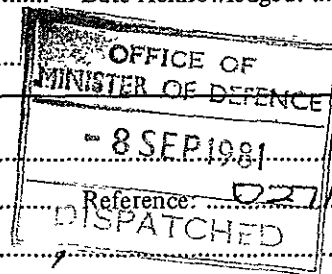

RNZAF UFO SIGHTING REPORT

The unidentified radar and visual sightings reported by aircraft and the Air Traffic Control radars off the north east coast of the South Island recently, are the result of natural but unusual atmospheric phenomena.

This is the 'conclusion?' arrived at in the Air Force's just completed investigation into the sightings.

Before arriving at his conclusions, the investigating officer interviewed all the principle witnesses involved in the sightings on the nights of 20 and 30 December. He also worked closely with the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, the Civil Aviation Division of the Ministry of Transport, and the Meteorological Service.

His report reveals that during the months of December and early January, atmospheric conditions over New Zealand were conducive to freak effects on radar and light waves. Also, the planet Venus was rising in the eastern sky early in the morning, and at this time of the year is unusually bright in appearance.

It was also revealed that for some time the Wellington Air Traffic Control radar has been giving spurious returns off the east coast of the South Island.

Over the period more than 50 Japanese squid boats sailed from Wellington to a position 120 miles off Banks Peninsula.

Not only would the squid boats give a good source of radar return whilst in transit to the squid fishing grounds, but they generate a very large amount of light when fishing at night. Each boat generates about 50 kilowatts of light to attract squid to its lures, and this light source must be discounted as a cause of some of the visual sightings.

The investigating officer also speculates that lights seen in the Clarence River mouth could have come from trains or vehicles travelling long the coast, and affected by unusual atmospheric reflections and refractions.

There is no evidence to connect the many radar and visual sightings in the Clarence River and the larger lights seen to the east.

A Ministry of Defence spokesman said the Ministry was completely satisfied there were no unexplained physical objects in the skies at the time of the sightings.

The lights were almost certainly from surface or planetary sources affected by atmospheric reflection, refraction and distortion.

Radar sets are known to be subject to spurious returns, and it was significant that on the occasions the large light was being filmed by a television team on board the Argosy freighter, neither Christchurch or Wellington radars reported any related visual sightings on their screens.

The spokesman said that the Ministry of Defence was not specifically charged with formal responsibility for investigating so-called unidentified flying objects in peacetime. However, the Ministry does take an active interest in all such reports and within the limitations of its resources, conducts investigations as necessary.

Commenting on some media speculation that the country was defenceless against air attack, the spokesman said that New Zealand did not have a complex air defence system, comprising sophisticated radar equipment and a force of missiles and interceptor aircraft.

The recently announced Defence Review explains that over the next decade at least, a physical threat to New Zealand's security, by sea or from the air, is so remote that expenditure of funds on sophisticated air defence equipments could not be justified.

No costing of a comprehensive air defence system for New Zealand had been done, but the Defence spokesman said that the bill would be enormous and well beyond current resource levels.

The Defence spokesman concluded by saying that the Ministry totally discounts the possibility of visits to New Zealand, and particularly to the areas of the country where the recent reports have suggested, of alien aircraft or other flying machines. It also categorically discounts any suggestion that air activity of any kind has taken place which poses any threat to New Zealand's security. Defence does not share the view of those who believe we are visited from outer space, or covertly by the aircraft or machines of potentially unfriendly nations.

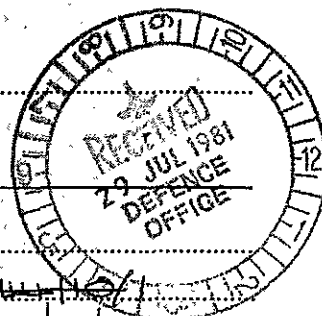

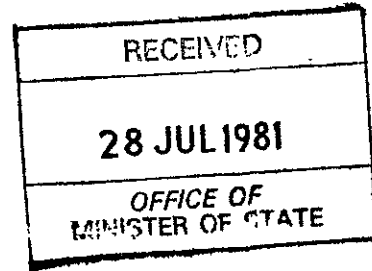

'78-'79 UFO SIGHTINGS

Dear Sir,

There is a ^{very} matter I should have taken up with you when we visited Blenheim recently. I assume things would get out of hand if I had raised these points at the meeting on July 15th 1981.

I was very disappointed in both the RNZAF and DSIR Reports regarding the Hokitika UFO sightings. I wrote to the author of the DSIR report and asked him a number of questions about his report. Enclosed is a photo-copy of his letter dated 24th March 1980. I consider it was written in bad faith. You might not know it; but a sighting apparently took place near Waikawa Bay, Blenheim on the 17th December 1978. This sighting was in some ways more impressive than the 'Argon' sighting. The principal witness phoned the Air Traffic Control at Woodbourne while the sighting was in progress. They could not give a stuff about it, and said it was probably a parachute plane. ie. a distress signal. This is most likely how Mr. Ireland jumped to his conclusions in his letter. I wrote and told him so. He refused to answer my letter. Instead Mr. M. A. Collins answered it.

See his letter dated 23rd May 1980.

He says in his letter his laboratory does not have the capacity to investigate UFO sightings. In other words his Dept. does not know what it is doing. Further on in the letter he says he is not prepared to further, with third parties to the observation. This is interesting because the authorities did not want to have anything to do with this sighting. The Air Traffic Control and the Police know about this sighting.

I suggested to the principal witness that the DSIR might want to hear from you as they do not want to deal with me. He wrote to the DSIR. The DSIR replied saying it was too late to investigate that sighting. The DSIR did not look at that within 18 months of the sighting taking place because it was apparently too early to do so. Mr Collins says I should take the matter up with someone else; why should I? It was his Dept. that put out the report.

I wrote back to Mr Collins. See a photocopy of another letter from him, dated 7th January 1981. Actually, the DSIR did put forward an explanation for the Waikeana Bay sighting; it is in Mr Ireland's letter dated 20th March 1980. The DSIR checked out the sighting 6 months after it was too late to investigate it. They realised they could not explain it.

He also says once again that I should try and find an explanation for this sighting; why should I?; it was his Dept. that put out

the UFO reports.

I now withholding my last return would I received a satisfactory answer from Mr. Collins. I have since filed my last return.

There have been two official UFO Reports. (The RANZAF one and DSIR satellite one). Both reports treated the sightings and the witnesses as a joke. I would like to see a serious report on these sightings as the government has paid for it.

I cannot show you Mr. Donald's 2nd letter as he has refused to assist. Also Mr Collins has refused to write his 3rd letter to me.

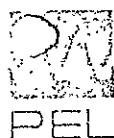
Of the twenty-seven or so sufficiently well documented sightings of nocturnal lights studied in this report, none has been found for which a simple explanation is not possible. The sources proposed were known to be present at the times of the observations, and must be discounted by the witnesses if the sightings are to remain unidentified.

In the most widely publicised "encounter" nothing unnatural, apart from the impressions of the witnesses, seems to have occurred. This UFO was almost certainly a brightly-lit squid fishing boat caught in the act. It is therefore considered that the acronym UFO should refer to UnFamiliar Observations, rather than to Unidentified Flying Objects.

In answer to your question, it covers only those sightings between 20 December 1978 and 10 January 1979 because most of the widely reported sightings occurred during that period. 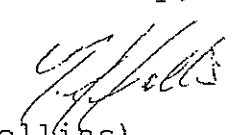

Thank you for your letter of 19 May and the reference to your previous letter of 24 March 1980. I must apologise that your previous letter was not acknowledged as being received by the Department. However, you should appreciate that this laboratory's function is to encourage the development of industry in New Zealand, and it has no expertise or mandate to investigate UFO sightings.

One of our officers, Mr W. Ireland, has studied some specific sightings for which photographic record and other hard data was available. Additionally, Mr Ireland attempts to help members of the public when requested, where they have personally made unfamiliar sightings.

However, we are not prepared to go further than this where tangible data is unavailable, or with third parties to the observation. I understand Mr Ireland did indeed reply to your first letter informing you of the information he had received at that time. You are obviously at liberty to accept or reject such information as valid, but I see little merit in entering into extended speculative dialogue, particularly with a third party, in the absence of any hard data. Hence, from my laboratory's point of view, the matter must rest here. If you wish to pursue the matter further, I would suggest you do so with the body formulated for this purpose. I understand you are already in contact with Dr J.F. de Bock, of ECRA, which may be the appropriate body.

I have received your letter of 10 December concerning the Waikawa UFO sighting. In this letter, you refer to earlier correspondence with my laboratory and acknowledge the receipt of two letters from us - one from Mr W Ireland of 20 March, and one from myself of 23 May - which were intended as replies to your correspondence and to clarify our position for this particular sighting for you.

It appears that you are still in some doubt as to our position, and I will attempt to clarify this in answering the questions in your most recent letter.

In Mr Ireland's letter of 20 March, he pointed out to you that his investigation of sightings between 20 December 1978 and 10 January 1979 were selected because ".... most of the widely-reported sightings occurred during that period." In this context, "widely-reported" indicates not only reported in New Zealand, but in the international media in addition. I believe this criteria represents a logical basis for selection.

We are fully aware that a parachute flare is a distress signal, and we are also aware that such flares are not uncommon in popular boating areas. However, I should make it clear to you that this was not our evaluation and that the Physics and Engineering Laboratory have not put forward an explanation for the Waikawa Bay UFO sighting, nor are we in a position to do so.

Your letter seems to imply that we have not discussed the Waikawa Bay sighting with the witnesses of that event. On the contrary, officers of my laboratory have discussed the sighting with the witnesses, who seem quite happy to accept that we are unable to offer an explanation for this particular event. Hence, I repeat that I see no merit in continuing dialogue with third parties to this sighting.

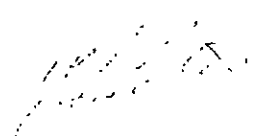

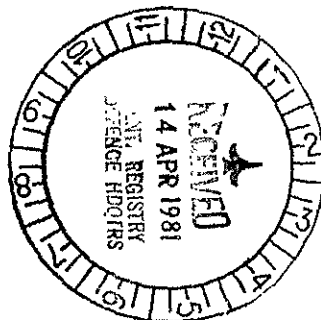
