Mr. [REDACTED], Rheems, Pa., reported observing an unidentified flying object on 10 August from 0055Z to 0110Z.

Mr. [REDACTED] reported that he observed two lights from the porch of his home in Rheems (7633W - 4008N). According to Mr. [REDACTED] the lights remained in a stationary position roughly south of his vantage point. The observer physically described the larger of the two lights as being elliptical in shape and yellow in color, with its longer axis being in a vertical plane. The other light was reported to have been somewhat smaller and round in shape and pink in color, located slightly below and to the left of the larger object. Mr. [REDACTED] related that both objects appeared to be larger and brighter than any of the surrounding stars.

Mr. [REDACTED] was unable to give any estimate of altitude or speed and reported no sound. His wife and son also witnessed the phenomena.

The weather at the time of the observation was clear with 12-15 mile visibility.

This Office can offer no definite explanation, but the reliability of the witness, to say the least, is uncertain.
